CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S MANAGEMENT REPORT – JUNE 2023

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Chief Executive's Foreword

With the current good weather we are experiencing, many of us will be visiting the beautiful coastal walks and beaches that Fingal has in abundance. Fingal has 88km of coastline and is home to some of the most beautiful beaches and coves on the east coast. Last month, An Taisce announced the Blue and Green Flag winners for the year and I was delighted that Fingal is now home to three Green Flag and one Green Coast Flag beaches. Velvet Strand in Portmarnock and South Beach in Rush retained their Green Flag status while Balcarrick Beach in Donabate was one of only 8 locations in Ireland to be honoured with both a Blue and Green flag. These popular locations are among 94 blue flags and 65 green coast awards sites around Ireland that have met the most stringent criteria. These awards are a testament to the work that goes into maintaining and managing these sensitive ecological gems and are the result of sucessful collaboration between council and local communities. commitment to ensuring excellent quality bathing waters as well as clean and safe beaches is unwavering and we rely on visitors to these coastal retreats to leave only memories and to enjoy the waters safely and responsibly.

In further good news for Fingal in recent weeks, our concept garden 'A Breathing Space for Fingal' won Gold at this year's prestigeous Bord Bia Bloom festival in Phoenix Park. Designed by the talented Jane McCorkell, "A Breathing Space for Fingal" showcases the invaluable contribution of welldesigned open spaces to the overall liveability of our villages, towns, and cities. This exceptional garden underscores the importance incorporating nature into our everyday lives. Incredibly, nearly all the construction materials used for the garden were sourced from Fingal County Council yards and this practice perfectly demonstrates how upcycling and recycling can impact positively and sustainably to create something truly magical. Following the conclusion of the Bloom festival, 'A Breathing Space for Fingal' will find a permanent home as part of a Community Garden located in Lanesborough Park, Meakstown in Dublin 15. The garden will also serve as a lasting tribute the people who endured hardships during the challenging period of the Covid-19 pandemic, reminding us of the importance of resilience and the healing power of nature. I offer my congratulations to all involved in the design, construction and maintenance of this beautiful space and hope it will be enjoyed for many years to come.

I am pleased to announce that this month, applications will open to allow interested parties to purchase homes in Hayestown, Rush under the Affordable Housing Scheme. 52 homes, ideally located in the bustling coastal community of Rush, will be available to buy with applications opening on Monday, June 12. Homes on offer under the scheme will be a mix of two and three-bedroom houses. Prices for eligible applicants will start at €228,000 for a 2-bedroom, mid-terrace house, with prices for a 3 bed mid-terrace house starting from €284,500 and prices for a 3 bed semi-detached house starting from €299,500. The provision of good quality, sustainable and attractive homes forms an essential part of our housing strategy and to support emerging allows us communities by building infrastructure and amenities to complement developments such as Hayestown.

Recently, the stunning setting of Shackleton Gardens in Clonsilla played host to Shackleton Gardens proms. This wonderful event was a celebration of the best in Classical music hosted by Fingal County Council and Festival Director Duo Chagall with the Fingal Ensemble and was a hugely anticipated and highly enjoyable event. Over three days, talented musicians and ensembles performed pieces from classical works to music from the movies, much to the delight of the hundreds of people who attended the event. I am certainly looking forward to next year's Proms!

Summer is a season that lends itself to the persuit of enjoyment and getting together as a community to plan local events. At the heart of each of our localities are community and resource centres who in collaboration with community volunteers provide exciting programmes for families and young people to enjoy over the holiday months. I

am delighted therefore, that funding has been allocated to projects and initiatives which will provide entertainment, education and fun for hundreds of children all across Fingal. The recently launched Summer Projects Programme provides for an overall allocation of €57,720 to over 30 Community Groups and Services through the Community & Sports Division's Summer Projects Funding Scheme. Participating projects will deliver a supervised programme of recreational and educational activities for young people during the summer period including environmental awareness, civic awareness and integration. I wish everyone involved in these programmes all the very best for a busy and creative summer!

I was delighted to attend The Mayor's Awards on June 1 at which unsung community volunteers were celebrated and recognised for their dedication and commitment to their localities. Nominees came from all walks of life from communities all across Fingal and it was an incredibly uplifting event to hear stories from those who give freely of their time to ensure their communities, local sporting clubs and groups not only survive, but thrive. I'm sure you will join me in congratulating all those who received their awards from Mayor of Fingal Cllr. Howard Mahony and wish them continued success in their endeavours.

The summer concert season in Malahide Castle is almost upon us with the first of seven concerts taking place on Wednesday June 14 with iconic band Depeche Mode taking to the stage. Musical stalwarts such as Paolo Nutini, Blur, Sam Fender, Florence + The Machine, Sting and Hozier will also play their greatest and much loved hits at this fantastic venue. The staging of these concerts is a mammoth task involving multiagency collaboration and several months of careful planning to ensure the safety of concertgoers and the minimum of inconvenience to locals. I would like to express my appreciation to those who have been working hard behind the scenes to ensure these hugely popular shows are a great success. From one castle to another - Swords Castle is all set to open the gates and welcome back firm favourite Nathan Carter with support from Andy Coogan on July 28. Following on from a hugely successful show last year in the castle, this show is sure to be nothing short of outstanding. The following night, July 29 will see Spandau Ballet's Martin Kemp take to the stage for an 80's extravaganza. Guaranteed to take us all back to that musically exciting era, Martin will be joined by a Cher Tribute, Choons and MC Enya Martin.

Wellbeing Update:

Wellbeing Seminars:

The scheduled seminars for May were 'Beating Burnout' and 'How to be happy' these were aimed at the issue of managing stress. Upcoming seminars will take place in July and August with a focus on Anxiety and mental health. Titles to be announced in the coming weeks. So far this year we have delivered 23 seminars with a total attendance of 1042 staff.

Employee Assistance Service:

Our next report from Spectrum life was presented to the committee and champions at our quarterly meeting on June 1st.

The results from these reports and the meeting will steer our future supports and initiatives for staff. In Q3 and Q4 we will focus on Mental Health and Anxiety. We are hoping to announce mental health first aid training dates in Q4. There will also be scheduled visits in the depots to increase awareness of the EAS and a re-advertisement on Staff Messages. We also increase awareness off the EAS by giving presentations at all staff inductions and by handing out EAS cards at all in person training courses.

Menopause in the workplace:

The menopause in the workplace training is ongoing. The training section will issue reminders to all staff that have yet to register and complete. This training is for staff and managers and will help to increase awareness and understanding around menopause in the workplace. Key outcomes are: Understanding menopause & symptoms | Impacts at work | Menopause business case | Role of manager | Supporting your colleagues & team| Legislative Risk. We will receive quarterly reports from the menopause hub on uptake and continue to promote completion of the course.

LGMA Wellbeing Programme Funding:

We are in the process of completing our application to the LGMA for this fund and hope to secure the maximum amount of €12,000 towards our wellbeing programme.

Pets for Wellbeing competition:

We ran a competition for national workplace wellbeing day asking staff to send in pictures of their pets for a chance to win a one for all voucher, there was a great response to the competition with over 90 entries and the digital content manager Mark Broderick put together a slide show for staff to view all the wonderful pets.

Fingal 10K:

We have had a good response to the call for staff to take part in the Fingal 10K, 66 staff will take part this year. We have provided them with training programmes for all levels from beginners to advanced. These programmes are available to all our staff through SharePoint.



Learning & Development:

In 2023 there are continued high levels of training being provided to improve capacity and competency of our staff while ensuring health and safety compliance. New courses and opportunities are being added all the time.

Scheme of Assistance

The staff scheme of assistance programme is also available for staff who wish to further their education in related areas. The program provides funding for applications ranging from certificate up to doctorate level. We have currently approved 14 applications this year including: Msc in Energy Management, Msc in Information of Libraries Management, Horticulture, Project Management, Drinking Water Treatment Certificate and various levels of Local Government Studies courses.





CRM

Staff continue to work on the Customer Relationship Management System (CRM) and issue responses to representations from Elected Members (Councillors, TDs and Senators) and complaints submitted by the public. The month of May had a total of 771 Elected Members' representations.

<u>Digital Services</u> Digital Working

In May, staff took part in 9,141 Teams meetings. 29,188 Teams calls were made, and 962,813 emails were received or sent by the Council.

1,209 support calls were logged by Council staff with the Digital Services Service Desk in the past month and 5 calls were logged by Councillors with Sord. 100% server availability and 99.9% network availability was achieved in the month of May.

Infrastructure & Support

The Infrastructure & Operations Team continued with the Switch Upgrade Project in the Civic Offices and Depots. Teams Meeting Rooms projects advanced in Skerries Library, Coolmine Operations Depot, County Hall and the Civic Offices, Blanchardstown. A substantial program of work was undertaken which included the expansion of the Councils vSAN to enhance Disaster Recovery and Business Continuity services.

May saw us record 126.7k visitors to fingal.ie (up 11.6k), with 315k views in that period (also up, 26.8k). Access via phone was the most common method (86.6k), more than double that of desktop computer. Average time spent browsing our pages was just shy of two minutes. Planning applications was the most visited section (14.2k), while our jobs page had 6.4k visitors

Facebook

Facebook had a reach of 249,363 in May, while the number of followers continues to rise to 30,618. A post on a housing information event to be held in D15 was the best performing one on Facebook

where it recorded 51k impressions and had a reach of 31.7k. Instagram recorded a reach of 37,445 (up 57% from April) and gained 272 new followers (to 6,834).

YouTube/LinkedIn

May saw the Council's YouTube channel gaining 35 new subscribers and surpassing the 1,000 mark. People watched our videos 10.5k times, driven by the D15 cycle roundabout, the 3D visualisation of New St in Malahide and completion of the refurbishment of three vacant homes in Portrane. On LinkedIn, we are now at 7,368 followers.

Media

We issued 23 press releases in May. This included the competition to name a Howth goat, the Disability Housing Strategy, the Bealtaine Festival, the Playful Streets pilot, Blue Flag success, the opening of a new Children's Interpretive Centre at Casino Model Museum and €1.7m allocated via the CRF.

Alongside this, there were 27 reactive media requests across the month, focussed on issues surrounding housing (HAP; social housing; eviction ban), daa runway/noise & the Blanchardstown fire.

Building Facilities Management

The installation last year of 11kwp PV panels on County Hall, Swords has generated 3.181MWh so far in 2023. This is equivalent to 5.4 Trees, €1,591 in self-generated electricity.

Tourism Strategy 2023 - 2029

A draft Tourism strategy, draft implementation plan and a findings report with insights from the research and consultation phase were received in mid May. Following several meetings with our consultants a revised draft strategy was received on 30th May based on those conversations. The strategy is on course to be presented to the June meeting of the EETCD SPC and if approved by the SPC to the full council meeting in early July.

Fingal Food & Drink Network





The Fingal Food and Drink Network members participated in the launch of Flavours of Fingal County Show on the 30th May.

Plans for the Network's presentation at Flavours of Fingal County Show are very advanced. The network will present an interesting mix of cooking demonstrations, food pairing, a focus on sustainability, panel discussions and foraging walks. There will also be a showcase of local produce.

Excellence in Local Government Awards







An application for the Excellence in Local Government Awards under the Supporting Tourism category was submitted in May. Based on the launch of the Fingal Food and Drink network in November 2022 and how this network is fostering collaboration among stakeholders, improving food promotion, supporting food talent in Fingal and establishing Fingal as a food and drink tourism destination. The Fingal Food Tourism project

leverages the rise of mainstream interest in food to explore new consumer markets and drive business to a wider range of tourism suppliers working in the food sector.

Fingal Food Policy

The first draft of the food policy is due to be received on 31st May. Following review of this document further meetings will be held with the internal team and the consultant with the policy being on track to be finalised by the end of June 2023.

Our consultants are finalising the scripts, images and augmented reality features that will be on the app and will provide us with a draft of each trail shortly.

EETCD are exploring the possibility of launching the heritage trail app for Balbriggan in conjunction with Smart Balbriggan and the brochure they are planning on active walking and cycling trails.

Casino Model Railway Museum - Children's Interpretative Centre









Celestial Mechanics

Celestial Mechanics presents a learning experience for children through both visual art and science at Dunsink Observatory. This unique engagement with children aged 10-12years will involve curator Rayne Booth of Superprojects, artists Aileen Murphy, Mary Jo Gilligan and Julia McConville, alongside scientist Prof. Peter Gallagher and educator Sadhbh Leahy of DIAS. Following a tour of the observatory and a screening of telescopic imagery, the children will be guided to create a series of large paintings inspired by themes of astronomy. On Saturday 10th June the children paintings will be on display at Dunsink Observatory for Cruinniú Na nOg. Public Art

St. Patrick's & Art Trail Skerries – Works of art by 5 artists, Bennie Reilly, Atsushi Kaga, Mary Conroy, Marie Farrington & Liliane Puthod have been installed as part of a programme of works for Skerries funded as part of Failte Ireland's Destination Town award. Each artwork was inspired by the artists visit to Skerries and their stature allows them to be quietly integrated into the beautiful environment.

The artists were selected from Fingal County Council's Public Art Panel and were considered to be "early career" in their potential public art practice. The Arts office partnered with Leitrim Sculpture Centre to develop a bespoke masterclass programme for the selected artists to experience working with traditional materials such as stone, bronze and metal delivered by experienced public artists such as Seamus Dunbarr and Jackie Mckenna.

This programme had a huge impact on the development of the work for Skerries. The works will be listed on newly commissioned Map Boards which include a QR code detailing information and they will form part of the suite of walking trails that visitors and communities in Skerries can engage with, they will also include their own signs located near each work.

We are working closely with the Skerries Autism Friendly Town to develop a sensory story trail for the works and a documentary film will live on the new promotional website for the town.











Infrastructure – Fingal County Council's Public Art Programme

Echo's Bones – A collaborative film co created with young people who identified on the autism spectrum with artist Sarah Browne, was showcased at the Middletown Centre of Autism's annual international research conference at the ICC Belfast. The programme included a screening of Echo's Bones followed by a Q& A with the participant young people. The project was commended as exemplary and contributing to a more positive representation of autism through the arts. A book on the project featuring an introduction by Blindboy Boatclub and published by Fingal County Council is due for release later this year.



The Séamus Ennis Arts Centre

May sees the end of most of TSEAC's indoor events, as it ramps up for the Garden Party outdoor events taking place in the Piper's Garden from June to August. This season ended on a high with ticket sales 12% higher than May 2022, a very successful outreach event in Finglas to mark Séamus Ennis's birthday in his hometown, and a buzzing sunny Sunday in the Piper's Garden on May 21st; during which we held a food fair, had three International Drawing Day workshops and officially launched Josephine Geaney's striking art exhibition.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Fingal Skills Strategy



Fingal's TY Student Skills Expo 2023, held in partnership with DCU, is taking place on 3rd October and will be a one-day event at The Helix, DCU. Registration is available online and notices have been sent to all secondary schools in Fingal. The target audience is TY students and over 1,700 students are already registered to attend.









The Fingal Skills Strategy Team attended the kick off meeting in Brussels on 16th & 17th May for the SKYLA Project "Smart Specialisation Skills Ecosystems for the Twin Transition". The project will have a term of 4 years and will focus on enhancing the role of VET in smart specialisation

sectors. Projects partners include Italy, Poland, Sweden, Lithuania, Bulgaria, Greece and Belgium. The kick-off meeting focused on baseline and SWOT analysis of policy instruments in each country and on project management requirements. The Fingal team presented their policy instrument – Fingal Skills Strategy. The next meeting of the SKYLA Project partners is scheduled to be held in Fingal in November 2023 and planning for the city visit is underway



The Skills Strategy Implementation Group met in Newbridge House on the 24th May 2023 and reviewed progress on sectoral sub-groups and discussed plans for the Interreg Skyla Project, a review of the Strategy and plans for the Student Skills Expo in the Helix in October.







The EU50 event took place in the Bracken Court Hotel, Balbriggan to mark the 50 year anniversary of Ireland joining the European Union. The event was supported by the Department of the Taoiseach and the Department of Foreign Affairs as part of a programme of events involving local communities, industry, academia, institutions and civil society celebrating Ireland's membership in the European Union. Teams from schools in Balbriggan presented to a judging panel of local Elected Members on the subject of "The positive impacts of 50 years of EU membership for Ireland and what should the EU be focusing on for the future". There was great participation from the students and teachers from:

- · Coláiste Ghlór na Mara
- Ardgillan Community College
- Balbriggan Community College
- Loreto Secondary School

Mayor of Fingal Cllr. Howard Mahony presented the awards, with the students from Coláiste Ghlór na Mara taking first prize following the deliberations of the Judging Panel which was comprised of Cllr. Tony Murphy, Cllr. Grainne Maguire, Cllr. Tom O'Leary & Cllr. Karen Power.





The Council's application to Urbact for funding to lead a network of 9 small cities/towns in Europe on local economic development has been successful. The project will focus on the challenges and opportunities for green growth and sustainable economic development along transport corridors and the project duration is 2.5 years. Balbriggan is the lead town and the other partners committed to the network are Albu Iulia, Romania; Dubrovnik, Croatia; Kekava, Latvia; Ormoz, Slovenia; Parnu, Estonia; Santo Tirso, Portugal; Tuusula, Finland; Villena, Spain. The project will kick-off in June 2023.





CITIZEN, EQUALITY, RIGHTS AND VALUES PROGRAMME (CERV)

CERV is an EU Funding Programme for citizens' engagement and the implementation of EU rights and values. Fingal County Council has been awarded CERV funding to participate in 2 separate projects, which commenced in January 2023 and will continue for 18 months.

GREEN IT YOUR WORK





The second Green IT Your Work meeting took place in Alicante on 10th & 11th May. Representatives were present from Romania, Spain Greece, Cyprus, Slovenia, Croatia, Italy and Ireland who are continuing work on the objectives of Green IT Your Work.

The trip involved a visit to the Hogar Provincial composting centre which manages and maintains a community composting bio-waste pilot plant. A social centre managed by the Diputación de Alicante. The group also visited Casa Tápena (Onil) to learn about projects around environmental education and the use of the natural environment as a resource.

InclusEU



The InclusEU project which aims to encourage volunteer action as a social response for an inclusive Europe will see Fingal host an event in Balbriggan in September 2023. This event will highlight the work being done by Fingal and Foroige to encourage more young people to get involved in community volunteering. Starting in April, this collaborative project will see 20 young people from local secondary schools take part in leadership and sports education training with practical sessions tied into local Fingal led projects. Leaders from Foroige Balbriggan attended the Hungarian event from May 18th -21st

SUSTAINABLE FINGAL



The Council has collaborated with DCU and DAA to submit two funding applications on sustainable projects:

- 1. DIFFER is a proposal for a Feasibility Study of District Heating in Fingal & an investigation of the feasibility of district heating from data centres in Fingal to supply Dublin Airport which has been submitted to the SEAI
- 2. ATLAS is a proposal to consider AI real-time connect on-demand mobility as a service which has been submitted to SFI for the Sustainable Communities Challenge.



The Mayor signed the Circular Cities Declaration for Fingal County Council, which was approved by the Council at its meeting in January. Work is now commencing on an action plan to advance the objectives of Circular Cities in Fingal.



DUBLIN BELFAST ECONOMIC CORRIDOR

Fingal County Council has been awarded €150,000 by the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage under the Shared Island Local Authority Development Funding Scheme for a Feasibility development of Study for the regional innovation/enterprise hubs along the Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor. The Council is leading on the project with the support of the eight local authorities and two universities of the DBEC partnership. KPMG have been appointed to carry out the feasibility study and to date workshops have been held with 4 of the DBEC partners with workshops scheduled. Engagement further continues with the SME sector and is scheduled with the Chambers to inform the feasibility study. It is anticipated that the feasibility study will be complete in Q3 2023.

LOCAL AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT



FINGAL LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Fingal LCDC continues to oversee and administer the key areas of LEADER and SICAP and the various Local Development and Community Development funding programmes under its remit. The LCDC also manages the Healthy Ireland Initiative and the Social Enterprise Grants Scheme. The last meeting of the Fingal LCDC was held in April 2023.



FINGAL LOCAL ECONOMIC COMMUNITY PLAN 2022 – 2027

Following a procurement process consultants are being appointed to assist with the preparation of the socio-economic profile of the county, drafting the high-level objectives, facilitating the consultation process and drafting the LECP and initial 2-year Implementation Plan. Consultation on the new Fingal LECP and engagement with internal and external stakeholders is planned to commence in June 2023.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND



The Community Support Fund (CSF) was launched in January 2023 and is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development. Fingal was allocated €341,875 in funding for groups across the county. More 270 applications were received from community and voluntary groups in Fingal for the current and capital funding streams by the submission deadline of 10th February 2023. The evaluation of the applications has been completed and Minister Joe O'Brien TD announced the successful Fingal applicants for the 2022 Community Support Fund grant at an event in Donabate Portrane Community & Leisure Centre on 19th May 2023.

COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND

The Community Recognition Fund (CRF) was launched in January 2023 and is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development. Fingal submitted project proposals to DRCD for approval on the 15th March 2023.

Fingal County Council has welcomed the allocation of €1,748,912 under the Community Recognition Fund for 26 projects across Fingal.

There is an allocation of €850,512 for eight projects in Swords and €435,000 has been provided for four projects in Dublin 15. Three projects in the Howth Malahide Local Electoral Area have received a total of €92,000 while €96,600 will be spent on four projects in Skerries, Rush and Lusk. Three projects in Balbriggan will be funded by grants amounting to €44,000 while two projects in Baleskin will receive a total of €30,200 and one in Santry will receive €20,000.

60% of the funding must be drawn down in 2023 and 40% in 2024, with all projects required to be complete by 18th October 2024. The Fund is being administered by Fingal LCDC and consultation has been carried out with the LCDC, Local Response Forum and relevant stakeholders.

SICAP



The resources and staff of the Fingal SICAP Programme continue to be leveraged to assist with the Ukrainian Refugee Crisis response. The SICAP Programme continues to help in the response to this crisis and is a central resource to the work of the Ukrainian Refugee Community Response Forum. Additional funding has been received from the DRCD to help with the delivery of services to Ukrainian Refugees in Fingal and additional staffing resources from the Ukrainian community have been employed on the ground to assist with this. Confirmation was received during December that the Fingal SICAP Programme has been allocated €304,369 in 2023 specifically for Fingal's Ukrainian Refugee Response. Procurement for SICAP for the programme period 2024-2028 is anticipated to commence in Q3 2023 and the Department of Rural & Community Development has issued a Prior Information Notice on etenders in this regard.





LEADER PROGRAMME

In December, the Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action Group (LAG) approved in full the allocated LEADER 2021-22 Transition Programme for eligible projects in the administrative areas of Fingal, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and South Dublin.

On 26th January Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys, announced details of the applicant groups who were successful under Stage 1 of the 2023-2027 LEADER programme, Fingal LCDC was successful to run the next LEADER Programme for the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG.

The Dublin Rural LEADER LAG has moved to Stage 2 and drafting of the new Leader Development Strategy is in progress for submission by the 14th July 2023. A series of public consultation workshops with stakeholders have been held across the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG area in May to inform the new Leader Development Strategy.

Woodlands for Health

Healthy Fingal have partnered with Mental Health Ireland and the Sports Office to organise the Woodlands for Health walks. The programme brings service users from the HSE mental health services in Swords & Balbriggan to Ardgillan to interact with other service users and avail of mental health expertise in the calming and quiet atmosphere of the walking paths around the demesne. The occupational therapists are very happy with the impact on patients and the walks will continue until June 16th with the hope patients will continue to benefit both physically and mentally from the intervention.





Stroke Survivors Classes

Healthy Fingal in partnership with the Irish Heart Foundation and the Sports Office are supporting a stroke survivors' class in Dublin 15. The class, which started in May, will occur monthly (until December 2023) and is focused on older adults who have had cardiac issues in the past. The collaboration will see the addition of some low intensity exercise through the provision of a fitness instructor and used as an opportunity to provide participants with information and supports on quitting smoking and/or reducing their alcohol intake. The programme is open to anyone who has had cardiac issues, and anyone interested in attending can contact Katie ksoden@irishheart.ie for more details



ENTERPRISE CENTRES

Fingal's Enterprise Centres continue to participate in ConnectedHubs.ie.

ConnectedHubs.ie is a one-stop-shop for remote working hubs throughout Ireland.







On the 29th May the Mayor Cllr. Howard Mahony and Minister Darragh O'Brien attended Drinan Enterprise Centre in Swords to launch the new creative media studio 'The Studio Drinan' and their remote working hubs and the 'Workwise at Drinan' brand. The Studio Drinan provides technical equipment to enable new enterprises, existing businesses, students and community groups to use the power of social media through podcasts, YouTube videos and other platforms. The facility was developed with funding from the Department of Rural & Community Development under the Connected Hubs Programme. The funding also provided for solar panels and e-vehicle charging at Drinan, addressing environmental challenges around energy independence.

The new facilities are open now and further information on the facilities is available at www.drinanenterprisecentre.ie.



All three Enterprise Centres currently have space available to start-up businesses and businesses/ individuals who wish to avail of remote working options and facilities. Bespoke options or generic office fitouts can be considered.

Occupancy rates at the Council's three enterprise centres are all over 90%. The three Enterprise Centres currently support 65 businesses and over 320 direct jobs.



Demand for the new Remote Working Hubs in BASE and Beat remain strong particularly after running two Connected Free Voucher Scheme during August and December 2022.

Fingal County Council was approved for €50,000 in new funding to promote Remote Working Hubs in the County under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme Marketing Measure. A cross-departmental team within the Council is implementing initiatives to promote Fingal as a Remote Working Hub base for remote workers.

OUR BALBRIGGAN 2019 - 2025 REJUVENATION PLAN - A SOCIO-ECONOMIC STRATEGY

The Our Balbriggan Programme Office continues to support the Leadership Group and its five pillars, who meet regularly, to progress work across a range of economic and social measures including: Growing the Local Economy, Public Realm & Infrastructure, Education, Skills & Employment, Community Integration, Health &

Well Being and Community Safety. The Safe Balbriggan Pillar, Education Skills and Training Pillar and Local Economic Pillar Groups met in May. The Balbriggan Leadership Group, which is chaired by Professor Brian MacCraith provides oversight and stewardship for the plan's implementation. The Leadership group will receive updates on workplan objectives from all five pillar Chairs at the next Leadership meeting scheduled for June.



The Quay Street & Environs scheme is in final detailed design phase with works anticipated to commence Q1. 2024 and be completed on a phased basis in 2025, Tender documents to appoint a contractor are being prepared prior to being issued to E-tenders in July 2023. The Suitability Assessment Questionnaire is currently on e-tenders. Irish Water are due on-site in Quay Street on the 1st September. Car park resurfacing (Bath Road/Balbriggan FC & Bremore Castle) is progressing in advance of the site works at Quay Street.

The pre-planning process for 2 – 4 Dublin Street commenced in March. Planning documentation was presented to the Balbriggan/Rush-Lusk/Swords Area Committee (Services B - Strategic and General Matters) Area Committee in May prior to submitting to full council. 2-4 Dublin Street is to be transformed into a new Creative Hub. 8 workspaces at 2 Dublin Street and an ancillary connected space at 4 Dublin Street will support STEAM education, training and enterprise activities supported by SMART Balbriggan.





A comprehensive Balbriggan Public Realm Strategy - Masterplan & Design Guide and a Balbriggan Active Travel & Transportation plan are nearing completion with both expected to be published shortly further to final internal review.

A Balbriggan Shopfront Scheme was launched in early May with over 20 applications received.

Successful applicants will be approved and informed in early June.



Public Realm Strategy



Donnelly Civil Engineering Ltd and MWP Engineering are delivering a package of improvement works at Balbriggan Harbour, as part of a wider package of improvements. Work is progressing on the provision of new lights and shoreside services on the West Pier. The Harbour upgrade works are scheduled to be completed end of June 2023.



The Dublin Fleadh took place in Balbriggan in May, hosted by North Fingal Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Eireann – Craobh Na Mara celebrated traditional Irish music, song and dance, with a week-long series of events cumulating in over 500 musicians competing in a competition.





The Our Balbriggan Office continues to generate regular and unique content across all social media channels, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn with over 5.1k followers on Facebook.

TOWN CENTRE FIRST - LUSK

A structure, membership and Terms of Reference for the new Lusk Town Team has been agreed. Together with the Town Team there will be three Pillar Groups representing the Community, Business and Economy and Public Realm / Climate Action & Sustainability (to include Vacant & Derelict Buildings). The second meeting of new Town Team was held on the 29th in Lusk Cultural Centre.

TOWN AND VILLAGE RENEWAL SCHEMES

The Regeneration Office continues to oversee the implementation of the Rush Streetscape Scheme. The Council has been approved for €100,000 in funding from the Department of Rural and Community Development for the Rush Streetscape Scheme and 30 properties in the centre of Rush have approved for funding. Works will continue over the summer period and a number of premises have now been completed in the town.





A new Donabate Streetscape Scheme was launched in May and applications for this scheme are currently being sought from properties in Donabate Town Centre. €36,000 in funding has also been approved from the Department of Rural and Community Development for this Scheme under the last Town and Village Renewal Scheme 2022.

A call under the Town and Village Building Acquisition Measure for 2023 was announced in late March. Under the initiative, each local authority can apply for funding of up to €500,000, which they can use to purchase up to three properties in eligible Towns and Villages to redevelop into multi-purpose community facilities. The funding, under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme, is designed to make our towns and villages more attractive places in which to live, visit, invest and raise a family. An Application to the Department was made under this scheme for St. Margarets.



LEO Fingal provides a broad suite of support services to stimulate enterprise and enable small businesses to succeed. Some of the LEO highlights for May 2023 are as follows:

NATIONAL ENTERPRISE AWARDS 2023



Fingal achieved success at the National Enterprise Awards ceremony on 1st June, with finalist company Cream of the Crop scooping the "Sustainability Award". The Dublin 15 based business is a food-tech enterprise battling food waste by upcycling and using surplus ingredients to produce natural, delicious and healthy artisanal gelatos, sorbets and snacks.

FINGAL BUSINESS NETWORK LEARNS ABOUT CHATGPT





Fingal business owners and entrepreneurs turned out en-masse on Friday 12th May to hear all about ChatGPT and how to leverage it for their business.

The interactive session was attended by over 90 business owners who participated in a learning and discussion session about the benefits of using ChatGPT for business. The session also discussed the concerns and pitfalls of AI and generated much discussion among participants which carried on well into lunchtime with people staying to chat and connect over a light lunch at the Riasc Centre. The next Fingal Business Network event will be in September 2023.

FINGAL BUSINESS BRIEFING



30 people attended the May Fingal Business Briefing (FBB), bringing to 113 the total participants at 3 briefings year to date. The Fingal Business Briefing is a monthly event where owner/managers of Fingal-based small businesses and aspiring entrepreneurs learn how they can access a vast array of services from the LEO and other state agencies. The next Briefing is scheduled for Friday 9th June 2023.

FINGAL STUDENT ENTERPRISE PROGRAMME







Students from Castleknock College and Coolmine Community School represented Fingal at the National final of the Student Enterprise Programme in Croke Park on 5th May. Castleknock College scooped the Best Commercial Potential prize in Junior Category with their business "Dr. Ink", which designs and produces custom phone cases, with awards presented by Minister of State, Neal Richmond TD.

Meanwhile, the TY winners from Coolmine's business "Aura" attended an international enterprising exchange event as part of their senior category prize, presenting their project to counterparts in an EU-funded project in Barcelona. Over 1,200 students from 27 Fingal School's took part in the 2022/23 programme and plans are underway for the forthcoming year to commence in September.





MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME



The inaugural LEO Fingal Leadership for Growth programme is continuing with circa 20 businesses from both Fingal and Dublin City. A second programme is planned for September 2023. This is a hybrid programme (in-person and online) and enables ambitious owner/managers to develop their management capabilities as well as providing a networking platform. Another programme will start in September 2023.

ENERGY EFFICIENT GRANT SCHEME

A new Energy Efficient Grant Scheme launched on 26th May, to be rolled out through the Local Enterprise Offices. The scheme will enable small businesses to invest in technologies and equipment to make their businesses more energy efficient. The grant will cover up to 50% of the costs to a maximum amount of €5,000. The scheme aims to reduce the impact of small businesses on the environment and help them to reduce costs to enable them to become more competitive.

FINGAL ENTERPRISING WOMEN NETWORK





The Fingal Enterprising Women Network (FEWN) is continuing to welcome new members throughout 2023. Members have been contacted with a "Save the Date" to join Fingal Enterprising Women Network this Summer for a Networking Event on the 21st of June from 5pm – 6pm followed by a barbeque in Malahide Rugby Club. Further details on this event to follow.

TRADING ONLINE VOUCHER SCHEME



An initiative under the Government's National Digital Strategy, the TOV (Trading Online Voucher) scheme supports small businesses by allowing them to enhance their online offering by providing a grant of up to €2,500 for ecommerce and digital marketing activities. So far in 2023, a total of 28 applications have been approved in the amount of €59,844. The next Trading Online Voucher seminar will be held on Friday 7th July (online).

BUSINESS ADVICE CLINICS AND MENTORING

Business Advice Clinics and mentoring services continue to be offered in-person and online. To date the Business Advice clinic has offered advice and support to 398 clients in Fingal. The Mentoring Programme continues with a total of 119 clients receiving one-to-one mentoring YTD. LEO Fingal has a panel of skilled and experienced mentors from a range of business backgrounds. The panel of Mentors meet up on a regular basis facilitated by LEO Fingal. The next Mentor meeting will take place on 30th June where we are introducing "Mentor Information Sharing" sessions, where mentors will have an opportunity to learn from each other.

MICROFINANCE IRELAND LOANS

LEO Fingal provides a loan scheme through its partnership with Microfinance Ireland, with loans of up to €25,000 per approved applicant. LEO Fingal is actively promoting the availability of loans

from businesses that have difficulty raising finance from their bank. Applications are processed and assessed by LEO Fingal and submitted to MFI (Microfinance Ireland). Applications submitted through LEO Fingal are eligible for a reduced interest rate. LEO Fingal has processed and submitted five MFI loan applications YTD. LEO Fingal is currently organising an MFI Information Session in June 2023.

TRAINING AND EVENTS

The LEO Fingal team are busy planning the Q3 & Q4 Training schedule and adding new classes and programmes to the curriculum. The programme will be launched from end of June with the first courses available to book from early July. There have been 5 Start Your Own Business courses YTD with 57 attendees. The SYOB Bootcamp had 84 attendees during Local Enterprise Week with a further 113 Ukrainian nationals attending the U-Start programme in February. In Social Media and Digital Marketing, there have been 2 programmes run YTD, with 32 attendees.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR MICROEXPORTERS

The Technical Assistance for Micro Exporters (TAME) grant enables clients to explore and develop new market opportunities. The TAME grant part-funds the costs that can be incurred investigating and researching export markets, e.g. exhibiting at Trade Fairs, preparing marketing material and developing websites specifically targeting overseas markets. There have been 4 TAME Grants approved YTD with a value of €2,500 each.

UKRAINE ENTERPRISE CRISIS SCHEME



Assistance for business energy costs is being awarded to qualifying businesses affected by the increase in input costs or supply chain issues in relation to the Ukraine war. Clients are being advised to speak to the Local Enterprise Office to

assess eligibility and to apply. Applications are now open to Fingal based businesses.

DIGITAL START

The Digital Start Programme provides support to obtain digital strategy, technical and/or advisory services for eligible businesses. Digital consultants help to develop a unique digital strategy that transforms businesses by identifying they are on their digital business journey, developing a digital adaptation plan based on identified need and assisting to implement a digital plan. There have been 8 approvals in 2023 YTD.

FINGAL BUSINESS EXPO



Fingal Business Expo 2023 took place this year on the 31st of May in the Crowne Plaza Dublin Airport. With over 40 exhibitors and hundreds of attendees, this was an opportunity for businesses to showcase their products and services, generate leads, and make valuable connections.

The Business Expo featured a diverse audience of entrepreneurs, business owners, and professionals from a variety of industries with

keynote speakers, interactive workshops, and facilitated networking.

EVALUATIONS AND APPROVALS COMMITTEE

The Evaluation and Approvals Committee (EVAC) meeting met on 1 June and approved €111,850 in funding across Business Feasibility, Priming and Expansion Grants. Year to date €355,250 has been approved across nineteen applications by Fingal Businesses. A further 2 Agile Innovation grants to the value of €101,000 have also been approved in 2023. The next EVAC meeting is Wednesday 28th lune.



Street Lighting LED Programme

The Public Lighting Section will continue with the LED Programme in 2023 with 98% of all lights switched to LEDS.

70% of new Decorative LED fittings have been installed county wide.

The Public Lighting Area Works Programme was approved by the Area Committee and works will now commence. 2023 funding for specific public lighting projects to light up necessary walkways and connections to schools and buses will be assessed on a case-by-case basis.

Beaches and Lifeguard Service

Blue and Green Flag Awards 2023

The best-quality beaches along the Fingal coastline were announced by An Taisce at this year's National Blue Flag and Green Coast Awards held on 19th May.

Balcarrick Beach in Donabate, where the 2023 flag ceremony took place, has a 3.4km stretch of sand for beachgoers to enjoy along with great rockpools and a healthy bank of sand dunes to explore. This is the second year that the beach has been awarded both a Blue Flag and a Green Coast Flag, making it one of only eight locations in Ireland to get a double nod from An Taisce.

Across Fingal, there were three Blue Flags and one Green Coast Flags retained, with Velvet Strand in Portmarnock and South Beach in Rush being honoured alongside Balcarrick. They are among 94 blue flags and 65 green coast awards sites around Ireland that have met the most stringent criteria.

Preparations for Summer Season

Operations staff have been carrying out preparatory works for the commencement of the 2023 Bathing Season. Additional bins have already been deployed to all beaches to deal with the increased numbers of visitors expected. New Bin cages were also installed in Howth Malahide Beaches in preparation for the summer season. Additional cleansing crews will be operational from 5.30am on all beaches on Sunday and Monday mornings to undertake beach clean-ups prior to the arrival of the next day's visitors.

Lifeguard Huts were refurbished and have been deployed to all of the designated beaches. have A new lifeguard hut with observation tower has been installed at Burrow Beach in Sutton.


Lifeguard Service 2023


Fingal County Council sought to employ 45 beach lifeguards for the 2023 Bathing Season an increase of 5 on last year. However, following a rigorous recruitment process, for which we received 40 applications this year, the Council have secured just 27 lifeguards for the season ahead. Last year we were successful in employing 35. The availability of qualified and interested candidates has gradually reduced over the past number of years.

Of the 27 employed, there is a further reduction in availability during the month of June due to State Exams, completion of college work placements etc. To provide a 7 Day service on all beaches during July and August, we require a minimum of 35 lifeguards. The reduced number of 27 lifeguards this year will see us having to close some Life Guard Stations at some of the designated bathing water beaches in order to provide a full service at the busier and more challenging locations.

The Council will publish on its website www.Fingal.ie and through its social media platforms, notice of manned lifeguard stations, weekly in advance.


Licences


- Road Opening Licences

The Licensing unit continues to process and manage the licensing system for the County, applications are allocated by area for examination and conditioning which includes reviews of the existing carriageway, footpaths, cycleways, and grass verges. Applicants submit temporary traffic management plans for review to ensure all works are carried out safely within the public domain. Road Opening Licences are a cross functional process for the department and are essential for the asset management of Fingal County Council Road network.

217 Licences were granted in the month of <u>May</u>, **71%** of the which were granted by way of automation. Clerk of Works in each area continue to carryout regular inspections following road opening works by utilities.







Casual Trading License

The Castleknock/Mulhuddart Operations Department have advertised any available casual trading pitches in both February & April many of which have been taken up with a record number of Traders in 2023.

Any remaining available pitches can be found on the Fingal County Council website and applications will be taken on a case-by-case basis.

- Street Furniture

Street Furniture renewals are now up to date for 2023 & inspections continue to be carried out and will intensify throughout the summer months.

We will be issuing refunds in accordance with S.I. 256 dated 22 of May 2023. When preparing the budget for 2023 provision was made for income of €17,050.00 to date €23,625.00 has been received from Street Furniture Licences. This income will not now be realised and the consequential reduction in income and expenditure will be reflected in the Revised Budget for 2024.



Storm Water

- Stormwater Capital Programme 2023-2025

Fingal County Council are continuing to progress projects recently adopted in the 2023-2025 Stormwater Capital Programme. The 3-year programme includes 14 projects valued at approximately €3.63 Million. Below is a brief update in relation to the current status of some of the projects that have commenced and planned upcoming projects. A review is being taken of other projects on the programme.

Howth Stormwater Culvert

Topographical and Manhole Surveys are underway and will be followed by CCTV and Flow Monitoring Survey for the above scheme. The information from these surveys will inform the condition parameters of the existing sewer and will allow for a preliminary design to be developed. It is expected that the surveys will be complete by mid-June.

- Wendell Avenue/Heather Walk:

Stormwater sewer rehabilitation works in Portmarnock are now complete. In total 200m of collapsed sections of network have been replaced in the Dewberry Park, Wendell Avenue and Heather Walk estates. The works will improve the overall drainage efficiency of Wendell Avenue and increase the half-life of the road surface. Final road reinstatement works are planned for Q3 2023.





Burrow Beach

The status of this project is being reviewed with a view to progressing the execution of the work by Direct Labour. A likely start time is March 2024.



- Bath Avenue Storm Water Pipe

An in-house Design has been drafted and is currently being evaluated with a view to being progressed to the next phase. Scantech Geoscience Ltd have been awarded the contract to conduct a GPR and pavement thickness survey. Survey works will begin on the 07/05/2023. Once complete a project timeline planning exercise can take place and a commencement date can be planned. This project will commence a scheme involving the laying of a new Storm water pipeline along Bath Ave, Malahide to alleviate localized flooding and allow for future capacity.

Ongar Development StormWater Remedial Works

Remediation works have commenced on the drainage network in Ongar following its Taking in charge. The works, are being undertaken by Formac Contractors with design and supervision by OCSC Consulting Engineers and have a duration of five months.

- Storm Water Maintenance

The proposed Stormwater preventative maintenance cycle for 2023 is currently being planned and costed. Two areas not previously mapped and surveyed have been identified with work due to start in Q3 2023. A contractor will be procured with a Jet Vac Recycler truck and CCTV camera van. The Stormwater manhole cover and frame replacement programme for replacing assets at the end of life is ongoing.

A new galvanised outfall guardrail was installed at Greenfield Road in Sutton to replace an old asset and improve public safety.



As a result of a connection request for future development additional CCTV surveys are being carried out on the Ballycoolin Rd in D15. The network will be mapped, jetted and a condition survey report will be commissioned. To date a number of localised restrictions have been found and these will be removed. These surveys will determine the feasibility and capacity of this line to take the proposed increased volumes.

A precast headwall has been ordered for White's Road in Castleknock. This will be installed at an entry point to a local ditch.

An investigation is underway to determine the source of oil contamination of the Storm Water network at the Estuary in Swords. Fingal Environment section received complaints of oil in the inner Estuary. Water Services have since placed oil booms and soak mats. A Contractor is being procured to Map and CCTV the network to identify the source.

Works are ongoing on a Storm Water private drain under public restriction in Hamilton Avenue in Balbriggan. A new section of pipe will be laid to repair the collapsed section of pipe.

Assistance is being given by the Storm water Unit to *Baldoyle Tidy Towns* who have secured funding for a Biodiversity project on the Seagrange Park stream, Baldoyle.



Storm Water Connections:

Currently there is 1 connection application in progress with FCC as of the 26th May 2023. 5 new connection applications have been processed to date in 2023

Water Services

Update on the Framework for future of Water Services

A new framework for the future of water services was announced by the Minister on 24th June 2022.

Master Co-Operation Agreement

The Úisce Éireann/Fingal County Council Master Co-operation agreement was signed by the Council on the 5th May, 2023. This Agreement replaces the existing Service Level Agreement.

Effective Date

The Council are now awaiting an Effective Date. On that date UE will assume full responsibility for the delivery of all public water services. Fingal County Council is scheduled within the first tranche of local authorities to transfer and I is working with UÉ in preparation for the Effective Date.

➤ Industrial Relations

Notice Letter from the Unions was received by all local authorities on 15th May with regards to the withdrawal of labour by its members and the placing of pickets for 48 hrs from 0:00hrs on Wednesday 7th June until 24:00 hrs on Thursday 8th June. Industrial Action for 7th June was called off with all aspects of the Irish Water Framework to be honoured.

Water and Drainage Connections:

There are 16 applications in progress with FCC as of from 26/5/23 which consists of 4 Water Connection and 12 Drainage connections. FCC returned 20 applications to Uisce Eireann so far in May as per Maximo/d365.



Planning Applications

There have been 411 planning applications received to the end of April 2023. 61 of these applications were invalid leaving a total of 350 valid applications. The volume of applications received by Local Electoral Area (LEA) is detailed in the table below.

From January 1st, 2023, to April 30th, 2023, two Large-scale Residential Development (LRD) full applications have been made to the Local Authority. From January 2023 to April 2023 four decisions have been made on Large Scale Residential Developments. Of these four decisions all have been to grant Permission (1,416 Units).

An Bord Pleanála have issued 11 decisions on SHD applications in the period from January 2023 to the end of April 2023. Two decisions have been made to grant (365 units) in April and no decisions have been made to refuse in April. 10 SHD's (7,406 units) remain with An Bord Pleanála for decision.



Planning Decisions

A total of 395 planning decisions have been made to the end of April 2023. There have been 330 decisions to grant permission (84%) and 65 refusals of permission (16%). There have been 26 grants of permissions in respect of single house construction, 177 grants of permission for domestic extensions, 38 commercial/retail grants of permission and 23 grants of permission in respect of housing developments of which 12 relate to development of 2 – 20 units, 3 relates to 20 – 50 units, 4 relate to 50 -100 units and 4 which relate to development of 100+ Units.


Building Control Admin

Year to date January to April, there were 592 building control submissions made via BCMS.

During this period, this was made up of 295 Commencement notices, 144 Compliance of Completion Certificates, 94 Fire Safety related Certificates and 59 Disability Access related Certificates.

Commencement notices and Compliance on Completion Certificates are submitted through the Projects module on BCMS. Fire Safety, Disability Access, Regularisation and Dispensation/ Relaxation Certificate applications can be submitted online via the Applications module on BCMS and we are also still accepting hard copy applications directly into the office. Most applications are now being submitted via the online system.

During this cycle (January-April) the Building Control Admin team processed 460 decisions relating to Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificates. This was made up of 118 decisions to grant and 342 extensions of time.



Strategic Policy Unit

Fingal Development Plan 2023 - 2029

The Fingal Development Plan was adopted on 22nd February 2023. The new Plan will come into effect on 5th April 2023.

The adoption of the Plan marks the end of the 99 week process which included three rounds of public consultation, numerous webinars, meetings and over 2,600 submissions.

The Development Plan sets out the framework to guide future development within Fingal with the focus placed on the places we live, the places we work, and how we interact and move between these places while protecting our environment. The aim is to progress to a more sustainable development pattern for Fingal County Council in the immediate and long-term future.



The Fingal Development Plan is subject to draft Ministerial Directions at present. Fingal County Council received notification from the Minister of State for Local Government and Planning of his intention to issue a Direction pursuant to Section 31 of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended). This draft Direction was on public display for two weeks, between 18th April and 2nd May. 172 submissions have been received. In accordance with the requirements of the Planning & Development Act (as amended), a Chief Executive's Report on submissions received has been prepared and circulated to the Office of the Planning Regulator (OPR), the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, the Eastern and Midland Regional Assembly and Elected Members.

The OPR will now consider the Minister's draft Direction, the Chief Executive's report and any submissions received directly from elected members. The OPR can make a recommendation to the Minister to issue a Direction with or without minor amendments. And/or the OPR can appoint an inspector where there is a material amendment proposed to the Minister's draft Direction or further investigation is deemed necessary.

The OPR's recommendation to the Minister will be made within 3 weeks of the Chief Executive's Report.

Separately, the Council is aware of judicial review proceedings as follows: Daa v FCC, Reynolds and McDonough v FCC.

Sustainable Swords

The Sustainable Swords Strategy was agreed by the Members at the December meeting. this follows extensive consultation and engagement with the local community. The Strategy outlines 16 possible projects which would transform Swords. The agreed Strategy and all other supporting documents can be found here:

In May, the Sustainable Swords project was entered into the IPI awards on Friday in 4 categories.

Residential Zoned Land Tax

The Government's 'Housing For All – A New Housing Plan for Ireland 'proposed a new tax to activate vacant land for residential purposes as a part of the Pathway to Increasing New Housing Supply.

The Residential Zoned Land Tax was introduced in the Finance Act 2021. The process to identify land to which the tax applies is now underway and the tax will be payable from 2024.

The objective of the tax is to activate land that is serviced and zoned for residential use or mixed use, including residential use, in order to increase housing supply and to ensure regeneration of vacant and idle lands in urban locations. These locations have been identified within statutory land use plans as being appropriate locations for housing and they have benefitted from investment in the key services to support the delivery of housing.

Fingal County Council has prepared a draft map of the land considered to be in scope for the RZLT as of October 1, 2022.

121 Submissions have been received and reports issued to the applicants. A further 80 appeal submission were received and have been processed.

In Fingal a supplemental map has not been published as there was no additional land identified.

Built Environment Division

Building Control/Taking in Charge Section - 30/05/2023

Building Control

 There were 13 Building control site inspections in May 2023 with 42 separate buildings being inspected.



- There was 1 enforcement notice issued in May relating to non-compliance with the Building Regulations. There was also a warning letter issued with regards to noncompliance with the Building Control Regulations. There were 2 formal Section 11 requests for further information issued following site visits, and responses from other section 11 requests were dealt with and closed out.
- There were 3 developments namely Miller Glen phase 4, Silverbanks, Baldoyle and Balgriffin Grove in Malahide Taken in Charge in the May 2023 Council Meeting. We have Ballygossan Park Phase 1 in Skerries and the "Entrance off Roundabout on R121 opposite The Boulevard, Blanchardstown" advertised for the June 2023 meeting. We also advertised Rahillion Phase 2 and Knightsgate Avenue for taking in charge later in the year.
- The Ongar Remediation works contract is underway and Formac Construction are currently carrying out works in the Blackwood estate. O'Connor Sutton Cronin are managing these works on behalf of Fingal County Council.

Incorporating Sustainable Drainage Systems in Residential Developments



The GDSDS has outlined SuDS as a sustainable way to manage surface water as we prepare to meet the challenges of climate change. This example of Millers Glen in Swords, shows an example of surface water being held onsite, providing treatment via appropriate planting, and then discharging at greenfield runoff rate. This is a move away from the traditional method of collecting all surface water via piped systems which can often no longer manage the intense rainfall's being experienced.

Transportation Planning

PSI-027 Donabate Pedestrian Bridge

Following a number of months of careful design development and liaison by the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure project team with the project consultants and with Irish Rail, the technical approval documentation for construction of a new pedestrian and cycle bridge over the Dublin to Belfast Railway line at Corballis, Donabate has been approved by Irish Rail and submitted to the Commission for Railway Regulation for final review and approval. The new bridge will facilitate a safe and segregated pedestrian and cycle route and will enhance connections between the development lands at Corballis, Donabate Village, the railway station and Newbridge Demesne. Heads of terms have been agreed and necessary licence agreements are being finalised with the owners of adjacent lands to facilitate access to and construction of the bridge. Procurement for a main contractor for the

works has already commenced with a view to allowing construction to commence immediately the final approval from the Commission for Railway Regulation has been received.

PSI-042 Donabate Transportation Projects

A multi-disciplinary engineering consultant is currently being appointed to assist the Planning and Strategic Infrastructure project team to work on the initial phases of this project. The preferred tenderer has been identified and letters of intent are currently being issued. The initial commission under this framework will include concept feasibility, option assessment and initial design work for various transportation projects in Donabate including:

- M1-Lissenhall Interchange traffic study in collaboration with TII
- Provision of a new high quality link for all road users from the M1-Lissenhall Interchange to the western extent of the existing Donabate Distributor Road (DDR Phase 2)
- Blakes Cross Junction
- High quality walking and cycling infrastructure in and around Donabate Town Centre
- Coastal walking and cycling routes including the cliff walk.

Subsequent phases of work, relating to environmental assessment, planning consent, etc. will follow on in subsequent years as appropriate. Once the consultant is appointed, a more detailed briefing will be organised for the local area members.

PSI-034 Church Fields Link Road

The official opening of phase 1 of the Church Fields Link Road and ribbon cutting on a brand-new Safe Routes to School for Gaelscoil an Chuilinn and Powerstown Educate Together National School were celebrated on 29th May by Mayor of Fingal, Councillor Howard Mahony and local councillors, government Ministers and elected representatives. The new link road which includes cycle friendly Irelands first 'Dutch roundabout, high quality active transport infrastructure and upgraded crossing facilities on the Damastown Avenue roundabout will open to

the public in the coming weeks. Works continue to progress on phase 2 of the project including the pedestrian and cycle infrastructure on the parklands, parallel with Church Road, with the works to Wellview Avenue to commence in the summer also.








PSI-012 Broadmeadow Way Greenway

This unique project represents the first time a greenway will be constructed on a live railway embankment. It is also running through an SAC and SPA and surrounded by water. As such, the planning, environmental and technical challenges that the project has presented have been considerable. Notwithstanding that, the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure project team has been progressing works on a number of fronts, in order to advance the project in collaboration with the NTA and Irish Rail, our project partners. In the last two months, a land licence agreement has been concluded and construction of a temporary access track to facilitate access to landlocked lands north of Malahide Estuary has been completed. The contract for a civil and ground investigation contractor has been awarded and mobilisation of this works package which includes security fencing, new culvert and ramp will commence in June 2023 and will continue over the summer months under Fingal County Council and Irish Rail specialist supervision. This is an important milestone which will inform the detailed design of the northern causeway element of the project. The project team have appointed a specialist ecological and environmental consultant to advise, coordinate oversee multi-annual ecological

biodiversity surveys as required by our planning consent. A peer review of the causeway viaduct bridge detailed design by specialist technical advisors and been undertaken and comments are being reviewed by structural design engineers to finalise the design packages. There remain a number of project risks, these are being managed and will be communicated to the community via a comms strategy that is being developed at present.





PSI-039 R132 Connectivity Projects

A Project Consultant was recently appointed a Contract for Stages, Detailed Design and Procurement, Construction and Implementation, Close-out, and Review. A meeting took place with TII's MetroLink project team to coordinate both projects. The start-up meeting was held with the newly appointed consultants. The consultants are now drawing up a programme for the detailed design stage to undertake the project. There has also been ground investigation works carried to allow for informed decisions at the detailed design stage.

Ongar Barnhill Road

This project will underpin the development of the Barnhill LAP which will provide over 1,000 new homes in the Dublin 15 area. The tender process for the main contract is currently in train, with a tender submission date in mid-June. The tenders will be assessed over the following weeks and it is intended that a contractor will be appointed for construction in Q3 this year. Construction will last some two years. Further updates will be provided once the tender process has been finalised.

PSI-041 Kinsealy Walking and Cycling Routes

The consultancy framework is at stage 2 procurement for various Swords & Kinsealy

projects with the initial project being the Kinsealy Walking and Cycling Routes. The tender assessment has now taken place and the successful and unsuccess letter to be issued in early with the standstill period following this. It is expected that a consultant will be appointed in July 2023. Swords projects will follow on directly including the Western Distributor Road. Briefings will be undertaken with the local members at the next milestone stage.

PSI-005 Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Route

The tender evaluation assessment for the Construction Phase of the Harry Reynolds Road, Pedestrian and Cyclist Route recently took place and the Letter of Acceptance issued to Jons Civil Engineering Ltd. It is expected that the formal contract signing will take place in mid-June and the contractor is currently mobilising, with a commencement date on site for construction works targeted for early July. A pre-start briefing will be arranged with the local area members in advance of site works commencing.

PSI-023 Swords Western Distributor Road

The consultancy framework is at stage 2 procurement for various Swords & Kinsealy projects. The Swords WDR will be one of the early projects to be appointed, target date for the commencement of consultancy services is Q3 2023.





This series of events will be open to all members of the public and will provide an excellent opportunity for residents to speak directly with members of Fingal's Housing team in a one-on-one setting and get answers to any questions they may have.

Housing Loans Update

The Local Authority Home Loan continues to be in demand by prospective homeowners who cannot secure commercial lending to proceed with a house purchase. As of the 30th of May 2023, Fingal County Council have received 346 applications, of which 174 have been seen by the Credit Committee, after which 56% have secured approvals in principle.

The Loan application process in Fingal is now augmented by the introduction of an online application portal. As of the 14th March 2023 Fingal County Council introduced the portal to streamline the process and ensure applicants have all their documents in one place before submitting them. The portal is located at Local Authority Home Loan Lingal County Council

Housing Asset Management Report

Energy Efficiency/Retrofitting Programme

The 2023 Retrofit programme is well underway with works ongoing in Strandmill Estate, Portmarnock, Barnewall, Donabate and Rivermeade Park, St. Margaret's. The project features extensive improvements including electrical and heating upgrades, attic insulation, installation of triple glazed windows and doors along with PV panels where required to reach a B2/Cost optimal standard.

Work will shortly be commencing in St. Catherine's Close, Rush and The Court, Glasmore Park, Swords, while Whitestown Gardens, Blanchardstown is currently at survey stage.

Pilot retrofit project for private homeowners

Fingal County Council and the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) have agreed to undertake a pilot project to offer similar upgrades to privately owned homes, partially funded by SEAI grants. Carrying out energy efficiency upgrades to several houses in the same area can offer economies of scale and cost savings to homeowners. Strandmill Estate in Portmarnock has been selected as the pilot estate for this areabased approach and an information evening took place on May 23rd, at which presentations were made by the SEAI, Retrofit Energy Ireland Limited (REIL) and Fingal's Director of Housing & Community, Robert Burns.

EnergyCloud Pilot Project

Fingal County Council has become the first local authority in Ireland to partner with EnergyCloud to provide free hot water to homes using surplus renewable energy.

The pilot project with Fingal County Council's Housing Department is supported by SSE Airtricity and will see homes in Swords equipped to benefit from free hot water via EnergyCloud with the installation of an EnergyCloud smart device. Once installed, the devices will use surplus renewable energy, which would otherwise be wasted, to heat immersion tanks.

The installation programme has already commenced after being officially launched by the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage Darragh O'Brien TD on the 22nd May 2023. More information is available at https://www.energycloud.org/news/new-initiative-fingal-county-council/

Planned Maintenance Programmes Cyclical Maintenance - Scheme Painting

The Scheme Painting Programme provides for external painting and joinery repairs to Council housing stock and currently operates on a 6/7-year cycle. Works have recently commenced in Inbhir Ide, Malahide, Sheephill, Blanchardstown and Cnoc Dubh, Ballyboughal. Works are now complete in St. Cronan's Estate, Swords and Earnan's Wood, Portmarnock.

Housing Assistance Payment (HAP)

HAP continues to be the primary source of rent support for those in private rented accommodation. Fingal County Council has set up over 156 new tenancies in 2023 to date with approximately over 3,745 tenancies set up since HAP began in 2017.

The HAP team are on hand to deal with any queries from applicants and landlords in person at the Housing Department in the Fingal County Council Blanchardstown Office, by phone on 01 8905000 via the CCU or through email hap@fingal.ie.

Rents

The new rent review process continues and tenants are required to return their Rent Assessment Form with the relevant documents so that an assessment can be carried out and the correct rent charge applied to the account.

The Rent Arrears team are working methodically through accounts in substantial arrears to encourage tenants to engage with the Council in reducing their arrears. In cases where there is no engagement, despite repeated efforts, proceedings will progress through the legal arena and to date the Rents Section has secured one Possession Order with 4 others currently before the courts.

The Rents team encourage any tenant who is experiencing difficulty paying their rent to engage

with the Council to examine possible solutions. However, there are instances where tenants do not engage or make alternative payment arrangements and, in those situations, the Council needs to take further action

Private Rented Inspections

The private rented inspections team had another successful year in 2022, exceeding the target set by the DHLGH by inspections 6112 dwellings equalling 117% of the annual target, placing Fingal in the first quartile of local authorities nationally. For 2023, following the roll out of annual registration by the RTB and a project to streamline registrations, the target for 2023 is set at 4,576, equating to just over a quarter of 18,000 registered tenancies within Fingal.

The team continue to work on meeting this target and improving compliance.

Housing Tenancy Services Report Housing Support Housing Position

Housing List positions have been issued to all applicants.

Changes to Income Eligibility Thresholds

In accordance with Circular 48/2022 and changes being implemented via the Social Housing Assessment (Amendment) (No. 3) Regulations 2022, the Social Housing Eligibility Bands will increase with effect from 1st January 2023.









Total allocations for 2023 to date

Cluid housing association will be managing two new housing developments. These properties will be available for allocation in the coming weeks. The developments are based in Clonross Dublin 15 and Saint Marnock's Bay, Portmarnock, Co. Dublin. A total 44 properties will be available for allocation to applicants on the Fingal County Council Social Housing List.

Clonross Dublin 15

Clonross is a new development providing a total of 26 units including both 1 and 2 bed properties. Fingal County Council advertised this development using the choice-based lettings system. A high volume of interest was recorded and applicants have been shortlisted for nomination.



Saint Marnock's Bay

18 units have been assigned to Cluid housing association in Saint Marnock's Bay, consisting of both 3 and 2 bed properties. The 2 bed properties were advertised via the choice-based lettings portal, also receiving a high volume of interest.


Homeless Exits 2023

During the month of May 2023, 29 households exited homeless circumstances into various forms of social housing support - including into private rented tenancies under the Homeless HAP Scheme.

Homeless HAP accounts for 13 of these tenancies, comprising 9 homeless preventions and 4 who exited from emergency accommodation.

Separately there were 16 households that exited homelessness into social tenancies (5 of who exited emergency accommodation)

In total 9 FCC households exited emergency accommodation during May 2023.




Homeless Presentations

Fingal's Homeless Team continue to engage with those experiencing homelessness to offer advice and support. Homeless Assessments continued to be carried out.

In May 2023, there were a total of 44 full homeless assessments completed – comprising 26 families and 18 singles/couples.

To date in 2023 there have been a total of 222 full homeless assessments completed.



During May 2023, of the 44 Homeless Assessments carried out, 25 cases resulted from a **Notice to Quit** (NTQ) having been served, equating to 57%. **Renting a room** or licensee presenters are not protected by the Residential Tenancies Act and accounted for 1 of assessments during May 2023.

There are also a considerable number of people making contact stating that they are Homeless due to family breakdown (16%). Most of the other presentations to the Homeless Section are from living in overcrowded conditions (7%) and state that they cannot/will not return to the property. The remaining 20% comprise various reasons are outlined on the chart below.

Emergency Accommodation (including Fingal County Council Family Hubs)

There continues to be a high demand for Emergency Accommodation across the region for both families and individuals.

Rough Sleepers

The Homeless Services Team continue to liaise with the DRHE Outreach Team regarding any reports of rough sleeping, to establish their names and circumstances and to offer supports. Regrettably, some rough sleepers are reluctant to engage with service providers and may refuse offers to access emergency accommodation. Any rough sleeper who is willing to engage with the Outreach Team and/ or the Council or will be assisted.

The Council will carry out homeless assessments and every effort is made to encourage them to avail of homeless services.

Homeless Action Plan 2022- 2024

The DRHE, with the approval of all 4 local authorities in the Dublin region, has finalised the Homeless Action Plan Framework for Dublin 2022-2024. This Plan is the first plan to be put into operation since Ireland signed the Lisbon Declaration on combatting homelessness in June 2021, which aims to end homelessness by 2030. It will follow on from the previous Homeless Action Plan for 2019- 2021 and continues with the three key themes of **Prevention**, **Protection and Progression**.

The Plan was developed based on a detailed consultative process including submissions from various Stakeholders, interested organisations, Service Providers, Members of SPCs of the four Local Authorities, the Dublin Joint Homelessness Consultative Forum and the Statutory Management Group.

Preventing Homelessness, Notices to Quit and Tenant In-situ Acquisitions

Fingal County Council is aware that households in the Fingal area who may have received a notice to quit, which is also referred to as a notice of termination, from their landlord may be worried or unsure of what to do.

Fingal County Council and the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive (DRHE) would like to advise anyone affected of the services that are available to them in these circumstances.

- We strongly encourage tenants residing in the Fingal area, who have been issued with a notice of termination, to contact Fingal County Council as soon as they receive a notice from their landlord. The contact details for Fingal County Council are provided at the bottom of this page.
- When the tenants contact Fingal County Council, staff in the Housing Department will take note of the termination date.
- The Council advises the tenant to refer the notice to Threshold, a service funded by the DRHE to provide a Tenancy Protection Service for private renters in the Dublin Region, including Fingal. Threshold can also be contacted directly on Freephone 1800 454 454 or via their website www.threshold.ie which contains more information and advice on the validity of your notice.
- The Council's first response will be to try to prevent homelessness. This includes assessing the person's position on the social housing list, providing advice on applying for Choice Based Lettings, advising the person on the level of Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) they may be eligible to receive, and, in some cases, assessing if the Council can acquire the dwelling where the tenants reside if it is being offered for sale.
- Placement in emergency accommodation will be a last resort, if no other alternative can be identified

The Council has been engaging with tenants who have been issued with a notice of termination, as

well as their landlords, and following assessment, 7 tenant in-situ properties are at the sale closed stage. A total of 23 properties are at the sale agreed stage with a further 62 cases in the negotiation process. In addition, the Council is assessing a further 35 applications from landlords requesting Fingal County Council to purchase the homes with the existing tenants remaining in-situ.

The Council will continue to deal with notice of termination queries and cases as expeditiously as possible and progress tenant in-situ acquisitions while taking account of circulars and guidance issued by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

Fingal County Council continues to liaise with other Dublin and neighbouring local authorities to deal with tenancy issues that may require an interauthority approach. In particular, we are working closely with our colleagues in the other Dublin Local Authorities on the implementation of the Government policy and guidance, with a focus on the needs of tenants.

Whilst the Council will, in the context of current circumstances, adopt flexibility in dealing with potential acquisitions of properties with tenants insitu, any acquisition is subject to appropriate due diligence and checks before any commitment is made to acquire, including, for example, determining that a valid notice of termination is in place, the tenant has a social housing need, and the condition and valuation of the property.

The Government has out forward options to allow tenants who are not eligible for social housing to remain in their homes, including schemes to support the purchase of homes and a Cost Rental in-Situ Scheme. On the Cost Rental Tenant-in-Situ Scheme, this is available for tenants who are not eligible for social housing and are at risk of homelessness. The DHLGH has advised that local authorities are to be the first point of contact for this scheme, but it is managed by the Housing Agency. Under the scheme the Housing Agency can purchase a property and rent it to the tenant. Fingal County Council will undertake an initial assessment of the tenant's circumstances and

refer details to the Housing Agency for consideration, where the tenant is at risk of homelessness and the Cost Rental Tenant-in-Situ scheme applies. The Housing Agency will then make contact with the landlord with regard to the purchase of property.

Where a tenant wishes to purchase their home from the landlord, local authorities can provide advice about the Local Authority Home Loan scheme. The Government is examining implementing a 'right of first refusal' for tenants to purchase their homes, as well as expanding the First Home shared equity scheme. The Council will be able to provide more information on these when available.

Work around preventing homelessness, assessing notices of termination and responding to tenant and landlord tenant in-situ queries is being led on by the Council's Homelessness section, taking a tenant-centred approach, supported by staff dedicated to deal with tenant in-situ housing acquisitions. TRAVELLER ACCOMMODATION PROGRAMME

Traveller Accommodation

A significant programme of works in relation to the refurbishment and upgrading of existing accommodation on Traveller specific sites is currently ongoing in conjunction with staff from the County Architect's Department. These works

are in accordance with the objectives set out in the Traveller Accommodation Programme 2019-2024.

Regular site visits by Housing Inspectors continues on all Fingal County Council Traveller specific sites while checking on vulnerable residents and advising on the continued supports available. Council Officials continue to liaise and engage with the Traveller Community, Traveller Advocacy Groups, Welfare Services, Child Services, Mental Health Services and other services and agencies to resolve issues when and where possible.

ESTATE MANAGEMENT

Housing Welfare Service

The Estate Management Section continues to offer support to the most vulnerable of our Tenants in collaboration with our Social Workers, Tenancy Sustainment Officers and work collaboratively with external statutory agencies to protect and assist the most vulnerable through a range of support services.

Disabled Persons Grants (DPGs)

In accordance with the Disabled Persons Grants Scheme provided by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, the Estate Management Section continues to process eligible applications working in collaboration with the Council's Architects Department.

Housing Maintenance



Boiler Servicing Programme

The Council provides an annual heating servicing facility, including all maintenance and upgrade works, for a nominal fee of €3 per week to participating tenants. Contractors progress batches of work throughout the course of the year. The 2023 programme of work continues, with Contractors working across the County in areas such as Whitestown, Mary Brennan, Rossan, Bealing Avenue, Linn Dubh, Dun Saithne, Brega, Mooretown, Jugback and Castlegrange.

Anti-Social Behaviour/Inspectorate Unit

The management and sustainment of social tenancies and good estate management falls within the remit of the ASB/Inspectorate Unit.

Alleged breaches of Tenancy Agreements are investigated and pursued in accordance with housing legislation and policy.

There are occasions when the vulnerabilities. complexities and health related issues associated with a tenancy require tenancy sustainment and welfare intervention and supports. Ongoing case management and review with a variety of external agencies, including Approved Housing Bodies, An Garda Síochána, TUSLA and the HSE may be required agencies to ensure all collaboratively with a view to achieving best outcomes for our Communities. This work is ongoing in relation to a number of Tenancies in the county.

The Housing Forum for the Dublin 15 area has resumed, with the most recent meeting taking place in early May, with the next meeting date to be scheduled. The Housing Forum affords collaborative working between Council Officials, Elected Representatives, Statutory Agencies and Community Representatives in relation to good estate management.



Those Fleeing the Conflict in Ukraine

The Government is committed to delivering a humanitarian response to welcome people fleeing the conflict in Ukraine and seeking protection in Ireland.

Ukraine україни Украина | Fingal County Council The Council's Fingal Ukraine Response Forum continues to meet regularly to assist co-ordinate the response of the various statutory agencies and voluntary groups in the county to assist the Ukraine community

Liam Rodgers Rest Centre

The centre was re-opened as temporary accommodation for displaced Ukrainians on the 2nd November 2022 to cater for increasing pressures on the accommodation situation in the country for displaced Ukrainians. The centre is presently operating at full capacity utilised for new arrivals to the country with various statutory agencies linked with the centre to provide support to the new arrivals. Every effort is made to move the rest centre occupants to more permanent accommodation as soon as possible with a steady stream of moves to pledge accommodation. Supported by the Council and the Peter McVerry Trust (PMVT), **152 persons** have moved from the rest centre to pledge accommodation across the county and country since 2nd November 2022 with further moves to pledge accommodation to take place in the coming days.

Vacant Homes OfferAhome Accommodation

National call for vacant unoccupied properties (OfferAHome) to accommodate Ukrainian displaced persons was launched on the 24th of November 2022. In terms of the Fingal area, all suitable properties offered are occupied. The monthly recognition payment is €800 per month for vacant properties and €800 euro to host a Ukraine person in your home.

In addition to the 9 vacant properties that came into the ownership of the Council via CPO in recent years, 2 additional dwellings are advancing through the CPO process, one which has a large associated site. It is expected CPO will commence with respect to a third property shortly. The Croí Cónaithe Refurbishment grant scheme is also in utilisation to address vacancy, assist citizens get a home and is attracting increasing applications and enquiries.

Croí Cónaithe Vacant Homes Refurbishment Grant

This is a national scheme administered by local authorities introduced under Housing for All. This scheme provides new choices for people to live in towns, villages and rural areas in Ireland through the provision of a grant to support the refurbishment of vacant properties subject to the application meeting the scheme criteria. Note the scheme covers all parts of the country (urban and rural) and applications are accepted with respect to all geographical areas in Fingal. On the 1st May 2023, the scheme was further extended with the eligibility criteria now allowing for properties build pre-2008 to qualify and grants increasing to €50k (vacant) and €70k (vacant and derelict). The scheme now also allows for a grant for approved properties to be rented on the private-rented market when refurbishment is complete. Prior to the recent change, the grant approved property had to be the principal private residence of the grant approved owner.

To date, **42 applications** have been received under the scheme, **11** which have been approved in principle with further applications moving to approval stage. In addition, staff are engaging with **60** other expressions of interest which have potential to lead to further applications. For enquiries on the above scheme and on vacant

Community Development Office

Community Development

Community development is a process where community members come together to take collective action and generate solutions to common problems. Community wellbeing, economic, social, environmental and cultural challenges are often solved through collective action being taken at a grassroots level. Community development ranges from small

initiatives within a local group to large initiatives that involve the broader community

Building community capacity, strengthening community participation and involving people in decisions that affect their lives is a complex process and can only be achieved by working with local communities and agencies who have responsibility to the people in those communities. In April/May the Community Development Office worked in partnership with a number of community groups and partners to support the projects/Initiatives set out below

Launch of GLAS @ TU Dublin Community Garden

The opening ceremony of GLAS @ TU Dublin was held on 17th May on the campus of TU Dublin Blanchardstown. The event was led by the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr. Howard Mahony, who delivered an opening address and planted a fruit tree to mark the occasion. Music was performed by the students at St. Patrick's Senior National School, as well as contributions from students at St. Patrick's Junior School. The event was attended by local TDs, Councillors and representatives from many local organisations and community groups, as well as staff and supporters from across the networks of the three project partners; Fingal County Council, Global Action Plan and TU Dublin. This initiative is now open and available to the wider community of Dublin 15, and we look forward to it becoming a hive of activity over the coming months and long into the future.



Balseskin Reception Centre Environmental Project

Balseskin Reception Centre have been awarded funding towards a 5-week gardening, biodiversity and recycling programme commencing in May. This partnership project with Rediscovery Centre and IRS (Jesuit Refugee Service), will see the Rediscovery Centre run weekly on-site workshops, empowering and educating community members on permaculture and biodiversity in Ireland while engaging participants in Design Thinking. Participants will also explore recycling items that can be found in Balseskin for use in the garden; for example; food tins to create flowerpots and creating signage for the garden. This will be complimented by a concluding trip to the Global Action Plan Community Garden in Ballymun. The Operations Department also contributed to the project by delivering bark chippings, top-soil and a number of native trees which will be planted to act as a sound & wind barrier to the nearby M50.

Hartstown Community Centre Over 55s Event

Fingal County Council Community Office in partnership with Hartstown Community Centre and Hartstown Active Retirement Group hosted an information event for over 55s on Thursday 11th of May. This event is the fourth in a series of Over 55s events run across Fingal in the past 12 months. The event which was well attended by various organisations and provided opportunity for older members of the community to meet representatives from local services and organisations, to ask questions and find out information that can support them, their families and the wider community. The feedback from all attendees was very positive and one service provider is quoted as saying "these events are imperative not only for community engagement but as a networking tool for organisations and agencies.'





Expansion of D15 Stay and Play Toy Library

The Community Office has been supporting the D15 Stay and Play Toy Library to expand the service to the Ongar community where they launched another Messy Play Day on the 14th of May. This project continues to grow due to an unprecedented demand for this service in the local area.



Newly established One Voice Singers Swords, Give Back to the Community



'One Voice Singers Swords' was established with the support of Fingal Community Development Department and One Town One Voice in November 2022. The aim was to build a community singing group with an emphasis on diversity and integration in Swords. The members of 40 plus adults, rehearse every Tuesday evening in Colmcille's GAA Club, Swords and have performed at local events such as the Swords Christmas Craft Fair and Swords St. Patrick's Day Parade.

The group recently performed for the residents of Care Choice Nursing Home, Swords. The sound of the music and songs, old and new, made for a wonderful afternoon of entertainment and a great sing-along event at the nursing home. It also provided an opportunity for residents to chat with members of the choir and connect to the wider community. This was particularly important as residents in nursing homes often feel forgotten by the wider community in which they live. The group looks forward to expanding their repertoire and performing at events and in nursing homes throughout the year.

Pride of Place Competition 2023

The three Fingal entries for the 2023 IPB Pride of Place Competition, which showcases the best in community development in Ireland, have been selected. This year the communities of Garristown, the Broadmeadow Community Garden in Swords and the Draiocht Arts Centre in Blanchardstown represent Fingal in the north-south competition, hosted by Co-operation Ireland. Last year Mountview was the outright winner for Fingal in the Urban Neighbourhood category. This year Garristown will compete in the Populations of 500 to 1500 category. The Broadmeadow Community Garden in Swords will be represented in the new Climate Action and Bio-diversity Category. Finally, the Draoicht Arts Centre in Blanchardstown, D15 will represent the Council in the Creative Place Category. Judging will take place in September, with the finals scheduled for early November in Armagh.

Smart Villages Initiative, North Fingal

Six North Fingal communities are taking part in an innovative initiative supported by Fingal LEADER Partnership, KPMG Future Analytics and the Community Office. The Smart villages training programme for rural Dublin involves a cluster of north Fingal villages alongside Lusk and Balbriggan

participating in a series of online and in-person workshops. The objective of the initiative is to develop smart plans to strengthen the capacities of these local communities to develop innovative solutions to the sustainable growth and development community of each Ballyboughal, Oldtown, Garristown and the Naul are in the rural cluster group and are working on producing smart village action plans alongside Balbriggan and Lusk. The topics covered include digitalisation, social research techniques, the role of health and wellbeing and the role of sustainable tourism and the social economy. The workshops will continue throughout June.

Fingal Mayors Awards 2023 - Community Champions

On Thursday 1st June, Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Howard Mahony presented 24 awards to Fingal's unsung heroes. The Mayor's Awards recognised Champions Community across Fingal celebrating the amazing work undertaken by individuals who have volunteered their time to support their local communities over the last year. The gala event which took place in the Crowne Plaza, Blanchardstown recognised, honoured and celebrated the achievements and endeavours undertaken by the unsung heroes in our community. These are the people who go under the radar by helping others selflessly and often don't receive the recognition they deserve for the work they do to make Fingal a great place to live.



Summer Project Funding Award Launch



County Council's Fingal Summer **Projects** Programme was launched by the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr. Howard Mahony and Robert Burns, Director of Housing and Community Development on Wednesday 17th May 2023 in the County Hall, Swords. Attending the launch were young people alongside representatives Donabate from Community Centre, Blakestown Mountview Youth Project, Foroige Dublin North, Blakestown Mountview Youth Initiative, Sophia Housing, Mulhuddart Community Centre and Blanchardstown Travellers Development group. Over 30 community groups and services have received €57,720 in funding through the scheme. Participating projects will deliver a supervised programme of recreational and educational activities for young people during the summer period including environmental awareness, civic awareness and integration.

Fingal Managing Volunteer Award Launch



In celebration of National Volunteer Week, Fingal County Council Community Development Office

and the Fingal Volunteer Centre relaunched the Fingal Managing Volunteers Award. The Award focuses on promoting good volunteer management practice in community and voluntary organisations across Fingal. The award was first launched back in 2011 with over 25 groups successfully awarded. The Fingal Managing Volunteers Award ensures that groups who wish to, or already involve volunteers in their work, have good volunteer management systems in place and are a safe and positive place to volunteer.

FACILITIES

Solar Panels at Fortlawn Community Facility Mountview Community Youth & Sports Hub has secured funding under the Community Centre Investment Scheme, issued by the Department of Rural and Community Development, to install solar panels on the roof of Fortlawn Community Centre. This will further support Fortlawn's commitment to the 'Keen to be Green' project and will see a saving of €21,465 including installation over a six-year period. It is envisaged that 83% of the energy consumed during the year will be generated from the solar panels, 60% self-consumption and 40% will be exported to the grid. Installation will take place during May/June.

Second phase of Fingal Keen to be Green Facilities - water conservation



The Community Facilities Management Support Unit is continuing to support community centres to lead the way and drive forward the aims and objectives of the Keen to be Green facilities programme. In the focus was on May implementing and maintaining Water Conservation measures. The Community Officers, accompanied by the Environmental Awareness Officer Sinead Fox, completed a water audit on each centre. The results of which were reassuring. It is encouraging to see how some centres embrace water conservation and use costeffective measures to minimise wastage, display signage and promote drinking points within the centres. Sinead will continue to work closely with the CFMSU to interpret the information collated, before feeding back to the Keen to be Green working group.

INTERAGENCY

The Community Development office actively seek to work in collaboration with agencies to maximise service delivery and resources to communities In May/June the CDO supported the delivery of the following:

Fingal Public Participation Network EGM and AGM

The Community Department worked with the Fingal PPN Secretariat on the preparation and delivery of an EGM and AGM which took place on 29th May. All 681 member groups of Fingal PPN were invited to attend.

Fingal PPN membership

There are currently 535 community development organisations, 113 social inclusion organisations and 33 environmental organisations registered with the Fingal County Register/PPN Database.

Fingal Comhairle na nÓg Consultation

Fingal Comhairle na nÓg members took part in an online consultation on 8th May with Fingal County Council's Heritage Officer Christine Baker and consultant Sinead Begley. Their feedback and information will be used in the preparation of the new Fingal Heritage Plan 2024 – 2030. An artwork installation made by the members of the Fingal Comhairle is currently being displayed in Fingal Libraries throughout May and June, including Malahide, Baldoyle, Donabate and

Blanchardstown Libraries. The art piece was created using a graphic harvester at the 2022 Fingal Comhairle na nÓg AGM.

Playstreets




The launch of Fingal Playstreets took place on Saturday 27th May in Taylors Hill, Balbriggan. The neighbourhood-led street gathering saw the creation of a safe and easily accessible option closer to home for playtime and local resident engagement. A programme of Playstreet pilot events will take place in locations across the county throughout the summer bringing people together in a relaxed and safe environment, creating a sense of unity, fostering greater community spirit and importantly helping reduce social isolation. 
Cultural Awareness Masterclass for Staff

For elderly people, displaced because of war, this is a method that allows them to find the resources to move forward with their lives. The response was overwhelmingly positive, with all 10 participants expressing excitement to continue their course. Plans are now being made to extend this programme to Dublin 15.

Fingal Older Persons Council (OPC) Annual Conference 2023: Ageing Well in Fingal



130 people registered to attend the Fingal OPC Annual Conference 2023 which took place in Kettles Country House Hotel, Swords on Thursday 25th May.

Opened by The Mayor of Fingal, Councillor Howard Mahony, the theme of the Conference was 'Ageing Well in Fingal' and presentations given by expert speakers reflected this theme. Celine Clarke, Head of Advocacy, Age Action, spoke on the topic of 'Ageism' and how societal and self-directed ageism can inhibit older people's ability to age well. 
Following a thought-provoking morning, the afternoon provided mental relief but physical exertion as the delegates danced to the music of Stage 2.



Anti-Litter Anti-Graffiti Funding

The Community Office worked with Parslickstown House Community Garden, Corduff Resource Centre and Corduff Clean Up Group to make applications through Fingal County Council's Environment Department for Anti-Litter Anti-Graffiti Funding. All applications were successful.

Corduff Resource Centre will paint the railings surrounding the Centre to create a warm & welcoming entrance to the Centre in addition to enhancement of the garden area.

Parslickstown House Community Garden have been awarded funding towards their community garden space. The funding will be used to purchase equipment and supplies needed to create the garden as per the design which was created with the support of the GLAS @ TU gardener, Lee Geoghegan.

Corduff Clean Up Group are collaborating with Fingal County Council Operations Department on the upkeep of a space previously used for antisocial behaviour. They have created a colourful, pollinator friendly space which has been welcomed by the community. The grant will enable the group to expand the planting and orchard, to replace worn timbers from the beds and purchase new equipment.



SPORTS OFFICE

The Sports Office supports and delivers programmes aimed at increasing participation in

sport, targeting specific groups such as children, youth at risk, disadvantaged groups, teenage girls, women in sport, older adults and people with disabilities.

Fingal Sport's Parent and Toddler Programme

Fingal Sport Office offers a free Parent and Toddler programme in Balbriggan and Mulhuddart every Thursday at 10am. The programme involves an instructor who takes local parents and childminders through fun activities and child yoga to develop fundamental movement skills for the child.

The programme has over 50 participants in the two locations – Mulhuddart Community Centre and Balbriggan Clubs Combined Centre and continues to be a great outlet for parents to socialise and meet up once a week while their child interacts with toddlers their own age.



Technological University Dublin Sports Event

Fingal Sports Office partnered with Technological University Dublin Sport Management and Coaching students to run sporting events as part of their final year assignment. Fingal Sports Office are supporting the students in running their events by assisting them with event planning for Fingal Operations as well as with linking the group with local sports clubs to support them on the day.

The first event was Paddle for Pieta, over 50 participants met at Portmarnock Beach to dip into the sea for charity. The event linked with Malahide Swords Canoe Club who came on board for water safety and had a boat and kayaks on the water if anyone got into difficulty.

The second event was TUD Tag Rugby, the group linked with Fingal's co-funded development rugby officer for equipment on the day. Fingal Sports Office provided contribution towards the running of the event.

Fingal Sports Office hopes to partner with Technological University Dublin more frequently and plans to collaborate on events that both parties can target key demographics.





Fingal Sports Teenfit Programme

Fingal Sports Office have partnered up with local gyms to provide gym instruction and programmes to TY students across the county for Teenfit. Throughout May 120 students from Ardgillan Community College attend a nearby gym, Platinum, to be coached through exercises and safe lifting skills to improve their confidence and knowledge in a gym setting. The programme will be rolled out in September in different areas in Fingal with local providers.





Fingal Athletics League Finals Day

Fingal County Council's Sports Office were delighted to host the Finals Day of the Fingal Athletics League in ALSAA Sports Complex on 26th April

2,200 primary school students from 60 schools across Fingal came to ALSAA for the climax of the Fingal Athletics League programme. This year's event was the first since 2019 and saw a record number of schools taking part. The programme kicked off in early March with two local race meets in Porterstown Park, Castleknock for schools based in Dublin 15 and in Newbridge House, Donabate for schools based in North County Fingal.

The Finals Day event included runs of 300m for 3rd class, 400m for 4th class, 500m for 5th class and 600m for 6th class. In addition to the races, we had coaches from Athletics Ireland as well as FCC cofunded development officers from Cricket Leinster and Leinster Rugby to deliver some activities for the students to try their hand at.



Exercise: Energise Programme 2022/2023

As the post-primary school year draws to a close Fingal Sports Office and Exercise: Energise coordinators have been evaluating and reviewing this year's programme. The Exercise: Energise programme targets teenage girls, from first to third year, who are in danger of moving away from sport or physical activity. This Fingal Sports Office supported programme aims to encourage this group to sample a sport or a physical activity that they may not have a chance to try in their main Physical Education classes. Fingal Sports Office and Sport Ireland Women in Sport have supported delivery of this programme in post-primary schools for over 10 years. This year the number of secondary schools participating grew to thirteen across the county.

The unique element of the Exercise:Energise programme is the involvement of the girls in choosing the sport or physical activity. Many schools facilitate the programme either during lunchtime hours or afterschool. The girls participate in eight to ten weeks of activities each term ranging from self-defence skills, table-tennis, dance, zumba, ultimate frisbee, yoga, pilates and other more traditional sports such as volleyball, basketball and football.

The programme would not be a success without the dedicated teachers who as co-ordinators helped the girls design the programme.

Moving for Life - Outdoors

The summer Moving for Life classes have recommenced on the grounds of Lusk United in Rathmore Road. The classes will take place every Tuesday morning for seven weeks. The Moving for Life programme involves gentle movement and stretching to music. The group will undertake walks around the Lusk Hub as part of the programme and will get the benefit for their physical health and fitness during the warm summer months. The Lusk United football club provide full use of their facilities to the group. Over thirty participants have now registered for this programme and a second Moving for Life tutor is currently undertaking training and will be qualified in the autumn.

Sports Conditioning Teacher Training

Fingal County Council's Sports Office were delighted to deliver 2 Teacher Training Workshops in St. Georges ETNS Balbriggan and Lusk JNS. The practical workshops focused on ideas to improve children's fundamental movement skills with resources and access to Fingal's Learning Portal as additional resources.

Additionally, the schools are promoting children to take part in Fingal's Balbriggan Sports Hubs on Saturday mornings to help improve activity levels among children outside of school hours.





Transition Year Soccer Graduation and New Programme

Fingal County Council has been working in partnership with the FAI on a Transition Year Course for young males based in Corduff Sports Centre Dublin 15 whereby selected participants follow a year long programme of soccer, health, fitness and education since 2016. The class of 2022/23 graduated on Thursday 25th May in Corduff Sports Centre in an event which was presided by the Mayor of Fingal, Councillor Howard Mahony and joined by Councillors and Officials from Fingal County Council, the FAI, Course leaders and coaches. Special guests on the day included Ireland U21 Manager Jim Crawford & Ex Student and current Millwall FC Striker Aidamo Emakhu.

In September, Fingal County Council is very pleased to be extending this course offering to high potential girls, again in partnership with the FAI. This new course will mirror the successful course for boys which has been running since 2016 in Corduff Sports Centre. The course gives TY students an opportunity to sample full-time football training while also fulfilling their educational requirements and obtaining qualifications in coaching and fitness training.

Over the course of the 2023-24 school year, the 25 Transition Year students participating in the programme will mix their academic subjects with a range of football coaching courses and modules in Fitness Instruction, Media Skills and Personal Development, as well as football training and strength and conditioning work.

In addition, the participants will undertake an ITEC Fitness Instructors Course delivered by Litton Lane Fitness Training. They will also return to their local primary school one day a week to work with teachers in the delivery of physical education and gain valuable work experience. The Sports Office, FCC looks forward to this inaugural course commencing in September and hopefully welcoming participants to their graduation ceremony in 2024.

The group were then taken on a cycling tour of Dublin 15 to view some of the new cycling/walking infrastructure and the SRTS project implemented successfully at St Philip the Apostles.

After a quick lunch the group were then taken to Malahide, Swords and Lusk to view some the projects in those areas before returning to the Wee County later that evening.

Strategic Planning

Active Travel Strategy

Following public consultation, the revised Draft Active Travel Strategy was presented to the Transport and Infrastructure Management SPC. Following further presentations to the 3 Area Committees in April/May the plan was brought to the Corporate Policy Group and will be brought to the full Council in June.

Protected Cycle Lanes:

BLRS Area:

St. Cronan's Ave and Brackenstown Road Protected Cycle Lanes

The laying of the new red cycle paths along Brackenstown Road and St. Cronan's Ave is progressing well and will be completed in early June. The new roundabout layout with Zebra Crossings at Brackenstown Road and St. Cronan's Ave is now operational. Outstanding works of line

marking, signage, bollards and landscaping will commence in June.

R132 Ministers Rd to Blakes Cross + Kilhedge Lane

Construction contract is currently out to tender to appoint a main works contractor and the deadline for tender returns is 29th May 2023. An evaluation board will assess the tenders and aim to appoint a contractor to undertake the construction works by early July.

Seatown Road Swords:

Engineering consulting are finalising the Non-Statutory Public Consultation Summary Report which is due to be issued in June for review.

Donabate Portrane R126 cycle paths:

Engineering consultant is currently developing concept drawings and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement.

Coney Hill Balbriggan R132 cycle paths:

Engineering consultant is currently developing concept drawings and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement.

Pathfinder Pinnock Hill to Airport cycle paths:

Project team are liaising with Dublin Airport Authority and the National Transport Authority in relation to agreeing the scope of the project. Tender documents are being prepared and are due to be published in June for the appointment of a design team to deliver the project.

Howth-Malahide Area:

Baldoyle-Howth Protected Cycle Lane Scheme Phase 1

Tree planting works have been completed on Grange Road. 18 no. trees were planted in collaboration with Park Operations section. Minor snag items remaining to be completed on the rest of the scheme





Baldoyle-Howth Protected Cycle Lane Scheme Phase 2

Options report received and under review by Active Travel.

Paddy's Hill to Broomfield via Naomh Mearnog GAA

Design brief being prepared for the connectivity project. Once complete it is intended to run a tender competition to appoint a design consultant for the project. Small works are ongoing around the existing car park through Operations department.

Seamount Heights to Old Gold Course Link Park

Preliminary design was revisited after feedback from Active Travel and internal FCC stakeholders. A design proposal was presented to residents of Seapark Hill. These works are expected to go to tender for construction in Q3 of 2023.

Station Road Portmarnock Footpaths and Cycleway

Majority of works have been completed by contractor regarding footpath, cycle lane and resurfacing works. Awaiting ESB connection for the new pedestrian crossing on Station Road.

Feltrim Road Cycle Infrastructure

These works are expected to go to tender for a design consultant in 2023.

Scoil an Duinninigh to Waterside Footpath and Cycleway

These works are expected to go to tender for a design consultant in 2023.

BMCO Area:

Snugborough Road - NAC to Ongar

Work is continuing on the options report for the project after internal reviews by AT team. A workshop was held with the NTA in May. Subject to that meeting the Gateway 2 Report is to be issued to the NTA to gain approval to proceed to preliminary design phase of the project.

Clonee to Blanchardstown Shopping Centre

Data collection for the options stage of the project has been completed i.e., topographical, traffic surveys, tree surveys. This data will feed into development of the options report for the project.

Castleknock to Dunsink Lane

Work is continuing developing the options report for the project. Option for a rapid build option for Auburn Avenue is being explored as part of the design process.

Hartstown/Huntstown/Mountview Road

The phase 2b junction designs have been completed by the cycle design office (CDO). These designs are being reviewed by FCC before tendering for construction.

Castleknock to Blanchardstown via Farmleigh

Stage 1 of the SAQ has closed and tender assessment has been completed. We are now proceeding to Stage 2 of the tendering process.

Towns & Villages

Works are continuing in the development of an Active Travel Plan for a number of our Towns & Villages. Details are outlined below.

New Street

The submission and observation period, as part of the statutory consultation process, closed on Friday, 2nd of June. A review of all submissions and observations is currently underway. It is expected to present the CE report for the project to the July Council meeting.

Balrothery Active Travel Plan

Tender competition is ongoing and we plan to appoint an integrated design team consultant to commence work on the active travel plan shortly.

Skerries Active Travel Plan

Second tender published on Etenders for the appointment of a design consultant as the previous tender competition was unsuccessful. Applicants interested in tendering for the design services for the Active Travel Town Plans are due to submit Suitability Assessment Questionnaire documentation by the 12th May 2023 for the evaluation board to assess.

Skerries Harbour Road

Engineering consultant is currently developing concept drawings and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement. Internal workshops to discuss through the proposals are planned for June before progressing with public consultation phase.

Connectivity/Permeability

We are continuing to receive various requests for Permeability and Connectivity improvements from various stakeholders across the county. These requests are being recorded in detail for evaluation through a multi criteria analysis. The projects are then reviewed across the departments to identify if an appropriate means of delivery can be established on the ground. A number of projects identified through this process are being developed through the design phases for execution later this year.

Where other projects are being progressed in the area at either design or construction stage we endeavour to include these Connectivity and Permeability improvements within those projects.

Greenway connectivity support teams have been convened to review, design, and deliver active travel infrastructure that will enhance accessibility between the proposed strategic greenways and residential, educational, amenity and commercial zones. These support projects have been set up for Fingal Coastal Way, Broadmeadow Way/Sutton to Malahide Greenway and Royal Canal Greenway. This will help to optimise the use of the proposed greenway by both leisure and commuter users.

Newtown Bridge, Balheary Road:

Engineering consulting are finalising the Non-Statutory Public Consultation Summary Report which is due to be issued in June for review.

Rush South Beach:

Engineering consultant currently preparing concept design and options report for new universal access path. Discussions with Landowners will follow to get agreement on design options and for landtake required.

Access Constraints

Following on from circular (NGS Circular 4/22) and guidance from the NTA (Access Control of Active Travel Facilities) the Active Travel Unit has mapped the access constraints (in particular kissing gates) within Fingal. We have put together a list of access constraints to be considered for removal and works proposed to improve for pedestrians, cyclists and disabled persons. This list is currently being reviewed by the various departments to ensure that the removal of these constraints provide a positive impact in these areas. On completion of the review Fingal County Council Active Travel in conjunction with Operations will be coordinating the removal of these access constraints across the county.

Secure Bicycle Parking Infrastructure

Contractor is currently on site at various locations across the county and is progressing works to install a number of bike parking facilities across the county. Further works are planned in Swords and Dublin 15 areas in the coming weeks. Locations are currently being agreed for expansion of virtual ebike parking in public areas. Active Travel has taken delivery of six new bike repair stations and

will be rolling out two stations in each area and are now with the contractor with the intention to install May/June 2023

Road Safety Safe Routes to School

Round 1 - Tranche 1

The works contractor for the Safe Routes to School Tranche 1 contract is making great progress at each of the three school sites. Works to date have progressed well, with little or no disruption to the schools or traffic in each of the three areas. A brief update is provided below for each school site and associated construction works completed to date since the appointment of the works contractor.

Rush and Lusk Educate Together

We are nearing the completion of this Safe Routes to School project with all construction works and main planting of rain gardens now complete. The project team will do a final snagging walk through with of the design consultants, Operations and the Active Travel engineer to catch any final elements that need to be addressed.









Castaheany ETNS / St.Benedict's NS

Works are approaching substantial completion at the school. Advance warning signs have been installed at the school and the planting of the rain gardens is complete. The remaining works to be completed on site is the epoxy resin application. This will take place over the summer when the school is closed.





Bayside Junior & Senior School

Works are approaching substantial completion at the school. Advance warning signs have been installed. The planting of the rain gardens is complete. The remaining works to be completed on site is the provision of permanent parking signs and the epoxy resin application. This will take place over the summer when the school is closed and is weather dependent. Below is a photo of the junction of Alden Park/Verbena Avenue, before and after the planting of the raingardens.





Round 1 - Tranche 2

Design is currently underway for the Tranche 2 schools (4 no.) with a view to progressing to construction later in the year. An initial meeting has been held with the NTA regarding the preliminary designs of the project. Work is ongoing in relation to progressing the design to detailed stage.

Round 2

In mid-December An Taisce announced Round 2 of the Safer Routes to School programme, with the following Fingal schools selected:

- Holy Family Junior National School, Forest Fields, Swords
- Scoil Bhríde Buachaillí, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- Scoil Bhríde Cailíní, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- St Helen's SNS, Limetree Avenue, Portmarnock
- St. Colmcille's Girls' National School, Chapel Lane, Swords


The Active Travel team are working closely with An Taisce in relation to data collection and engagement with the schools to develop briefs to enable the tender process for designers and contractors to carry out the works.



ENVIRONMENT

Landfill Aftercare Balleally

Construction of the new maintenance building for Ballealy Landfill/Rogerstown Park are progressing well following the recent completion of the raft foundation and steel frame. Works are scheduled to take 18 weeks ending in September 2023.



EPA Audits:

The EPA carried out Environmental Audits at both Ballleally and Dunsink Historical Landfills. The audits included an evaluation of existing work practices, abatement systems on site and aftercare plans for both sites. No major non compliances were identified by the agency.

Climate Action

The Environment Climate Action and Active Travel Department is currently engaged with the DLA and the Climate Action Regional Office to plan for amending the existing CCAP's.

As part of this activity, the ECAAT Dept is coordinating input from across Departments, and

is engaging with internal teams on action review and development at present.

The Climate Action Regional Office is providing training and workshops for Local Authority teams relating to Sectoral Climate Action integration into the amended LACAP.

Environmental Awareness

The Green Schools Awards were held on 25th May in the City North Hotel. Congratulations to the 29 schools in Fingal that have been awarded new Green Flags - Details on our website https://www.fingal.ie/green-schools

The Environmental Awareness section provided support to the Balbriggan In Our Nature Festival and the Baldoyle Festival by supplying 200 food waste caddies and nature books for Eco-giveaways to the public. Eco-resource support was also given to Mount Sackville NS in Chapelizod. Scoil Choilm and St. Patricks in Castleknock and Donabate Portrane Educate Together National schools were awarded small funds for gardening and tools. Doggie Dispensers were sent to Lusk SNS for a local anti-dog fouling campaign. An Anti Litter Primary School Competition was launched-inviting schools in the Swords Balbriggan Area to design anti-litter poster for local parks signage.

Rush Tidy Towns were awarded funds for investing in a Sustainable Development Goals Outreach program and for painting for Harbour Lighthouse. Praxis-Care, a centre for disability, received a grant for tools and assistance to improve their allotment. Community Group Clean Up Corduff received a small grant for their community orchard.

The *Keen to Be Green* Water Use Assessments have been carried out in 22 community centres. This program seeks to improve the environmental performance of Fingal Community Centres in the areas of Waste, Water Energy, Biodiversity and Transport.

A group from Swords Prosper Fingal were given a tour of the Estuary Recycling Centre, the participants also availed of a few repaired musical instruments.

A cross-departmental cinema advertising campaign will begin in the 5 cinemas local to Fingal.

Topics will include Biodiversity, Food Waste, Conscious Cup and Waste Enforcement.





Litter Management

During May, the Litter Wardens continued with their daily patrols, including all the litter black spots.

Extra patrols were carried out on Fingal beaches during the week and at weekends to engage with dog owners and dispense dog poo bags, to make the public aware of their responsibilities to clean up after their dogs.

The Litter Warden also checked to see if any issues arose for the Operations crews, and they carried out inspections and followed up with fines/warning notice if evidence found. They also erecting anti dog fouling signage in areas where requests were received.

A total of **276 planned** inspections were carried out on litter black spot all over the Fingal County Council area. All the bring banks in the Fingal were inspected daily to ensure that there was no dumping. Any evidence found was dealt with under the Litter Pollution Acts. They carried out investigation on reports of abandoned cars and burnt-out cars. Local businesses were inspected, to ensure they were keeping their premises free of litter.

There were no cases before the district court in May. One case was paid in advance and was struck out.

Dog Warden Service

The dog wardens continue to carry out enforcement in the County's Parks & Beaches in relation to breaches of the Control of Dogs Act 1986 and Control of Dog Regulations 1998 and also educating the public on the responsibilities of dog ownership and to pick up after their pets when using the beaches/parks.

The dog wardens are also continuing with door-todoor licence checks. Dog owners should ensure that they hold a valid licence for their dog and if issued with a 10-day notice by the dog wardens, should present their licence Controlofdogs@Fingal.ie within the 10 days provided on the notice. Failure to do so may result in a fine being issued for failing to produce a dog licence when requested to do so by a dog warden and keeping a dog without a valid licence. The fine per offence is €100. 232 x '10 Day Notices' were issued by the dog wardens during May 2023. 98 fines were issued during May 2023.

Dog Shelter Service

Dublin County Dog Shelter holds "Meet and Greet" visits for anyone looking to rehome a dog. Visits can be arranged by calling the shelter and arranging an appointment. These visits can be arranged from Monday – Friday from 11am to 1pm and from 2pm to 3.30pm.

The shelter is also open on Saturday from 11am – 1pm. The shelter is closed to the public on Sunday's.



The dog shelter holds stray dogs picked up by the dog warden and dogs who have been surrendered by their owners either to the dog wardens or directly to the shelter. At the beginning of the month there were 9 dogs in the shelter. During May 2023, 23 dogs were brought to the shelter by the dog wardens as stray or surrenders, 4 dogs were surrendered by members of the public.

Of these 32 dogs, 3 have been reclaimed by their owners, 5 dogs have been rehomed to rescue and 6 have been rehomed to members of the public. At the end of May there are 16 dogs remaining in the shelter.

Horses

Weekly equine welfare inspections continue to take place on Dunsink Landfill to monitor the number of horses and any welfare concerns that the horses may have. Any horses with welfare concerns are removed from the landfill by our contractor to their shelter facility to receive veterinary treatment. The 10 hay feeders continue to be refilled weekly by the Operations Department to ensure adequate forage is available for the horses on the landfill until there is more grass growth on the site. Currently there are 82 horses on the landfill site.

There were 2 horses seized during May 2023, both found grazing (unauthorised) on public land/side of road. Neither of these horses were microchipped so notices were placed in local garda stations advising where the horses were taken from and requesting the owners to reclaim the horses within 5 working days. These horses were not reclaimed and are in the process of being rehomed.



Water Quality

On the 16th of May 2023 Fingal County Council held a public meeting in Balbriggan Library to discuss recent oil spills and water quality issues that arose in the Bracken River and Balbriggan Harbour.

In Q1 there were 3 oils spills which escaped into the River Bracken and a further oil spill which emanated from discharges within the Harbour. Fingal County Council has placed a number of oil adsorbent booms in the river as a protective measure while continuing to monitor surface water outfalls on a daily basis.




Fingal County Council are undertaking a pilot misconnection survey in the Bracken catchment with the assistance of staff from South Dublin County Council Life Project training on the 31st of May 2023.

Bathing Water Quality

Fingal County Council have completed all preparations for the commencement of bathing water sampling for the 2023 Bathing Water season which commences on the 1st of June 2023. A preliminary round of pre-season bathing water sampling is scheduled for the 29th of May 2023.

Waste Enforcement & Regulation Waste Complaints

A total of 21 waste complaints were recorded for the month of May. Waste complaints investigated related to backyard storage of waste, backyard burning of waste and unauthorised waste collectors. Awareness and education around the management of domestic waste in a sustainable and environmentally safe manner is crucial to ensure all households participate in a waste collection service as per the waste presentation bye-laws and use three bins (black, green and brown) to manage their waste. A number of different awareness campaigns are being developed at present for roll out over the coming months including a bus shelter campaign, a cinema campaign and social/print media campaigns to highlight key issues and help improve waste segregation and management of waste







Anti-Dumping Initiative 2023

The Waste Enforcement Section recently secured ADI grant funding totalling €94,900 for 2023. Education and awareness measures play a key role in encouraging long-term behavioural change and this was a key focus during the application process. The 2 projects submitted and approved by the Dept. of Environment, Climate and Communications were as follows:

Project 1/ Cinema Awareness Campaign

Development of 2 animated video clips to be shown across 5 cinemas at Charlestown, Santry, Blanchardstown, Balbriggan and Swords with 500,000 views guaranteed (July – Oct) Cost = €36,900.

A/ <u>Illegal Waste Collectors and Illegal Dumping</u> – unauthorised collectors offering a cheap waste collection service, they don't have a waste collection permit to collect waste, they dump waste instead of bringing it to a waste facility, significant clean up costs for local authorities. Court appearance and significant fines up to €5,000 and a criminal conviction if found guilty of illegal waste activities/illegal dumping.





B/ Waste Presentation Bye-Laws and Waste Presentation Bye-Law Project - Bye-Laws No. 2 - obligation to participate in a waste collection service. Establishing compliance with Bye-Law No. 2 is crucial, identifying those who currently don't have a bin collection service in place, clarifying how they dispose/manage their waste (illegal collectors, bin sharing agreement, brough to an authorised waste facility or civic amenity centre), increasing compliance with Bye-Laws No. 2 through education and awareness initiatives and enforcement action if necessary.





Project 2/ Waste Presentation Bye-Law Project

Phase 1 Data Processing & Cleansing. Waste data (addresses, Eircodes, No. of bins, frequency of collection, last lift) received from waste collectors operating within Fingal has to be processed and cleansed to allow Eircodes to be appended to establish a register of households who have a waste collection service in place as per S34(C) of WMA. Estimated 97,000 households with a bin service in Fingal. Once the data is cleansed and Eircodes appended it will facilitate the development of a reverse register and associated heat maps to identify households who don't have

a bin collection service in place for follow on investigations. Cost = €58,000.

<u>Waste Enforcement - Planning Applications</u> <u>and Planning Compliance</u>

The Waste Enforcement and Regulation Section review and comment on planning permission applications. To date for 2023 a total of 58 planning applications have been reviewed and reports issued. The proposed developments are assessed to gauge their potential to generate construction and demolition wastes and how these waste streams will be managed including by-product materials such as soil & stone and concrete. Typical conditions for sites of potential significance include:

Prior to the commencement of development, the applicant shall prepare a Construction and Demolition Resource Waste Management Plan (RWMP) as set out in the **Best Practice Guidelines** for the Preparation of Resource and Waste Management Plans for C&D Projects (2021). The RWMP shall include details of the various waste streams and expected tonnages which will be generated during site clearance, demolition and construction phases and any proposed exportation or importation of soil and stone material including destination/source locations, quantities and if any material will be assessed under By-Product notification. The RWMP shall also include specific proposals as to how the RWMP will be measured and monitored for effectiveness. All records (including for waste and all resources) pursuant to the agreed RWMP shall be made available for inspection at the site office at all times.





Once a development has been granted planning permission, compliance documents relating to construction and demolition waste operational waste management are forwarded to the Waste Enforcement and Regulation Section for review. The submissions are assessed for compliance with national legislation, guidance and best practice. To date in 2023 a total of 59 compliance submissions have been assessed by the Waste Enforcement and Regulation Section and reports issued to the Planning Department. It is vital to condition planning permissions and assess planning compliance submissions to avoid situations where unauthorised waste collectors are used and waste is illegally disposed of. Construction and demolition waste can include hazardous streams such as asbestos or contaminated soils therefore it is important waste management is considered from an early stage of development and authorised management contractors are used to carry, treat or dispose of construction and demolition waste which is a valuable resource.





<u>Draft National End-of-Waste Criteria for</u> <u>Recycled Aggregates</u>

The Environmental Protection Agency have published a draft National End of Waste Decision for recycled aggregate. End-of-waste marks the point at which a material transitions from a waste to a secondary product. Regulation 28(1) of the European Commission (Waste Directive) Regulations 2011-2020 (the Regulations), requires that in order for a recycled/recovered material to be classified as a non-waste, it must meet criteria set out in an end-of-waste decision

The criteria will be available to any waste operator to utilise, provided they hold an appropriate waste authorisation for the recovery of recycled aggregates.



This is an important decision as it will divert C & D material from the waste sphere and release much needed capacity for other materials at waste disposal/treatment facilities and encourage the development of the circular economy. The decision was open to consultation until the end of February and is now under review.



Illegal Dumping Awareness Campaign

The Waste Enforcement Section has been carrying out a campaign over the last number of months to raise awareness around illegal dumping and unauthorised waste collectors. A bus shelter awareness campaign was initiated during March and April 2023 regarding illegal dumping and the impact it has on our environment. A second campaign has been scheduled for June 2023.

Unauthorised collectors who don't have a waste collection permit and are offering a cheap waste removal service should never be used for disposal of waste materials. Always ask to see a waste collection permit to confirm they are authorised which can be checked on www.nwcpo.ie.

The Waste Enforcement Section has been posting items on Fingal County Council social media sites such as Facebook and Instagram to highlight the issue of unauthorised waste collectors and illegal dumping and the negative impact this has on everyone. Below are some recent posts with more information to be issued on a regular basis to reach as wide an audience as possible:





These types of campaigns are key to raising awareness among the public regarding illegal or 'man in the van' waste collectors as well as flytipping around our county and will continue throughout the year alongside the development of a number of new cinema adverts funded by the Anti-Dumping Initiative.
